MACKEREL is now selling along shore at \$10.50 a barrel. The hook and liners or shrimpers are catching a few, while the scoters are doing nothing. In conversation with an American skipper yesterday, he complained bitterly about hard luck this year, declaring that seven out of every ten vessels in the Bay have not caught enough mackerel to pay the fare of the crew home by steamer or railway. Many of the American crews are already trying to get home as passengers in other vessels, having abandoned all hopes of catching mackerel this season...
MATTHEW ARNOLD has expressed the opinion that the greatest weakness of America arises from want of reverence on the part of the people. If the philosopher-poet had been here yesterday, we fear that he would have been deeply shocked by the exhibition of weakness afforded at the People's Cemetery by the people of Charlottetown. The conduct of the crowd at the grave of Midshipman Watson seemed to show that we have no reverence for either the living or the dead. At any rate, it was very rude to press so closely about the place of interment that many of the stranger mourners could not reach it,—not to speak of trampling like so many cattle, over the new-made graves. The scene would have made a fitting subject for the scathing pen of Steeple Cleydon, and must have detracted largely from the favorable impression made upon our visitors by the courtesy of some citizens. When will our people learn to act collectively as if they knew something about decency, and were possessed by a spirit of self feeling?
