

Sellout For Alouettes, Tiger-Cats Game Saturday

MONTREAL (CP) — Montreal Alouettes and Hamilton Tiger-Cats, mighty titans of the Big Four football league, are sure of at least one thing for their return playoff clash here Saturday — they'll play before a sell-out crowd.

An estimated 24,000 people are expected to cram-pack every seat, nook and cranny in Molson Stadium for the game that will decide eastern Canada's representative in the Grey Cup classic.

So great was the demand for tickets that the Alouettes' office hung up the "sold-out" sign Thursday.

Alouettes will take a five-point lead into the last of the two-game, total-point series against the Tiger-Cats. As won the first game 14-9 Wednesday in Hamilton.

GREY CUP ANALYSIS

Winner of the series will play for the Grey Cup in Toronto Nov. 27 against Edmonton Eskimos if the western team beats its farm club — Kitchener-Waterloo Dutchmen — in the Edmonton Saturday.

The weatherman predicts top-notch football weather.

The game will start at 1:30 p.m. EST and will be telecast in central Canada and the United States.

Coach Douglas (Peahead) Walker, recalling how Hamilton knocked his Alouettes out of the eastern final last year, pushed his A's through a secret practice and scheduled another workout for today.

His one comment after Wednesday's game was "five points are just a touchdown margin."

STATION MAY BE OUT

Few changes are expected in the Alouettes' lineup. It is not yet known whether all-star tackle Jim Kowalski will play with a sprained ankle, or whether he will be in action. He dressed for the first game but sat it out on the bench.

Nobody doubts the Hamilton Tiger-Cats are big, tough, ready and eager. But can they accomplish what no other football club has done this season — beat the Alouettes at Montreal. It's a tall order and the odds are stacked against the defending Grey Cup champions.

Outwardly, the T-cats aren't a bit worried. They lost the hard-fought opener but the feeling is that they are only at half-time.

"That's on half the game," said captain Ralph Toophy after Wednesday's clash. "We'll win the second half on Saturday and take it all. We'll be in the Grey Cup, wait and see."

BRUISING FINALE

Tiger-Cats took an early train to Montreal Thursday night and plan a light workout in Montreal today. With the team went Vito Ragazzo, injured offensive end and defensive back who missed the series opener because of a charleyhorse.

Voyley hopes he will be sufficiently recovered to see some action against the A's.

All indications point to a bruising series finale.

Angry Sparks Fly In Wake Of Baseball Deal

NEW YORK (AP) — New York Yankees snared two young starting pitchers and a regular shortstop from Baltimore Thursday in a deal involving at least 12 players worth more than \$500,000, probably the biggest trade in baseball history.

Making a spectacular move to bolster their pitching staff after losing their first pennant in six years, the Yanks grabbed pitcher Bob Turley, American League strikeout king, and Don Larsen. They also acquired Billy Hunter to take over Phil Rizzuto's shortstop job. The Yanks said no cash was involved.

Gene Woodling, veteran outfielder on Casey Stengel's five straight winners from 1949 through 1953, went to the Orioles with right-handed pitchers Harry Byrd and Jim McDonald, shortstop Willie Miranda and two kid catchers, Gus Triandos and Hal Smith.

Three more men will go to Baltimore in the deal. The Yanks will get three or four additional players from the Orioles.

ANGRY SPARKS FLY

Sparks of angry comment flew in Baltimore from fans who were particularly upset at the loss of Turley.

One of the first to claim the deal meant another flag for the Yankees was Hunter, who said: "If the Yanks got Turley and Larsen, they're a shoo-in for the pennant next year."

Paul Richards, Orioles manager, explained he made the deal to "get the hitting and balance necessary to make a first-division contender." He added: "We're not through yet making deals. We might trade a catcher." First basemen Dick Kyboski and Eddie Waitkus are labelled surplus.

Boxer Martinez Offered \$20,000 To Throw Fight

NEW YORK (AP) — Vince Martinez, a handsome, 25-year-old welterweight contender, Thursday disclosed he was offered \$20,000 to throw an Oct. 29 fight with Carmine Fiore in Madison Square Garden.

The curly-haired Paterson, N. J., boxer said the bribe attempt was made by two men outside his home Wednesday, Oct. 27, just two days before the bout. He reported the incident to the New York State Athletic Commission and the New York district attorney's office on Thursday and on Friday proceeded to batter out a seventh-round technical knockout over Fiore.

District attorney Frank Hogan confirmed Martinez's story and said "an investigation is continuing." Hogan also informed Passaic county, N. J., authorities of the details.

Vince and the Martinez family disclosed details of the bribe offer after the hushed-up affair was broken Thursday by Sports Illustrated, a weekly sports magazine.

"We were told to keep it quiet," said Vince's mother, Mrs. Anthony Martinez.

The Prince Edward Islanders Hockey Club issued a protest to the Atlantic Coast Senior Hockey League last week concerning the undesirable change which was made in the league schedule by requiring the season to be played out for the benefit of the Islanders, who were unable to send a representative to the meeting. It seems as though the protest might meet with much approval in the club, but of course we must remember that the Hawks are the privileged team in the ACSHL.

The Hawks entered the league under several conditions the same as the Islanders, but the Islanders had a few requests to make to the league. Firstly the Hawks asked that it be unnecessary for them to play the visiting teams in the league. So, the league made a ruling that the Hawks would be subject to playing one of the three opponents in this competition, which is mainly to help a little road trips, and that the other clubs would not compensate a sanction when they were on the road. The Hawks club figured that they would profit much more if they had to play on Saturday nights instead of entering into the deal.

Well, they got their desired Saturday night matches. But the Islanders had requested that they be excused from weekend games, so as it turned out the Fredericton Capitals appeared on the schedule to play in Moncton on 11 of the Saturday night matches with Amherst making few starts in that respect. The Islanders were also granted their request and the schedule was drawn up and totally approved by all the clubs. A little over two weeks of the schedule was played and the Moncton club discovered that their Saturday night arrangement wasn't going to pan out as well as anticipated with the fans becoming tired of watching the Caps and Hawks battle.

The same as every other enthusiast, they wanted a bit of variety and have always been given that when the Islanders played in the New Brunswick center. Since then the Islanders have been compelled to partake of the whirlwind of the Hawks and will be the reason for a packed house in the Moncton Stadium this Saturday night and will also be some \$113. in the hole from it. However, the world is made up of many men with many different ideas. It would not seem that Islanders are being robbed of their Klondike washings by a group whose insight is only the width of their own conformed and struggling Maritime conference.

The red-hot Hawks took over the league lead Wednesday as they whipped the Caps for the second time in a row with goalie Nick Pidosny settling down to the confronting task and displaying some of the sensational net-minding that he is capable of when not in his usual highly-temperamental mood. It can be taken as a general assumption that all the teams are starting to strengthen before the player-signing deadline of December 15. The cellar-dwelling Ramblers will be a much stronger team when they make their next appearance to island fans. Already they have picked up a new defenseman and are waiting the arrival of goalie Cliff Hicks and the assurance of centerman Sherman White. Both are expected to join the club over the week-end. Hicks had a go in the Maritimes last year with the Glace Bay Miners. Before coming to the Miners he was sub-goalie in the Nova Scotia League and for some time regular man for the Ottawa Senators. White also has had plenty of professional experience, playing several games with the New York Rangers and working in the Quebec Senior League and American League for seven seasons.

Canadiens End Leafs Streak With 5-4 Win

MONTREAL (CP) — Montreal Canadiens, changing goalies when trailing after the first period, went on to overpower Toronto Maple Leafs 5-4 Thursday night in a blistering, wide-open game that broke the Leafs' undefeated streak of nine games.

A howling Montreal crowd of 14,892 saw their favorites come from behind, then give up a two-goal lead but win out with only 14 seconds to play on a goal by Jean Beliveau while the Leafs were shorthanded.

The win gave Canadiens a three-point bulge at the top of the National Hockey League standing over the second-place Leafs. Toronto bowled over Canadiens 5-2 Wednesday night in Toronto.

The Leafs' winning streak, snapped by Beliveau's brilliant goal, started October 27 and went to eight wins and a tie. Their last loss was on Toronto ice October 27 to Canadiens.

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Record Price For Kensington Race Horse

A deal which brought \$20,000 for Earle Semple's classy trotter, Dean Gallon, who recorded a mile mark of 2:04 3/5 during a work-out last August, was closed yesterday by acting agent Dr. F. C. Douglas.

The negotiations have been going on for some time and bring to the owner the largest sum ever paid for an Island owned racer.

Details concerning the new owner, trainer and driver were not available late last night, but it is thought that the Gallon horse has been purchased by a United States interest. Dr. Douglas yesterday stated that one of the Southern's top trainers, drivers will come to the Island to take care of the former pride of the Semple stables at Kensington.

During his record-making work-out last summer, several spectators saw him trot the first quarter in 31 seconds, the half in 1:02 2/5, go the final eighth in 14 seconds and finish twice-around the half mile track in 2:04 3/5. With the absence of mishaps and with a little more experience, Dean Gallon may well become one of the few to break the two minute barrier for the mile.

Halifax Man 6th In Snipe Racing

HAVANA, (AP) — Harris Whitmore of Middleburg, Conn., virtually clinched the western hemisphere snipe championship Thursday by scoring his third straight victory in four races. Two more heats remain in the title series.

Whitmore nipped the early leader, Jorge Mantilla of Cuba, by 44 seconds to run his point score to 6:21. He finished second in Tuesday's opening heat.

Dick Shaw of Halifax finished sixth Thursday and ranks sixth among the eight competitors in the point standings with 4,906 points.

Shaw, who finished 18 seconds behind defending champion Ted Wells of Wichita, Kan., said he started the six-mile race in last place and pulled up as far as fourth. But Wells and Clemente Inclan of Cuba passed him on the final leg.

Each contestant is entitled under the rules to drop his worst race from the over-all point standings. Shaw plans to drop the first heat in which he finished eighth.
