

**Inter-provincial Trade.**

While energetic efforts are being made to promote inter-provincial trade in the east, it is encouraging to see that the west is not forgotten. A late number of the "Daily Colonist," of Victoria, B. C., says:—"A large portion of the merchandise received by Monday's steamer was of Canadian manufacture and production. A heavy falling off in the volume of trade with Great Britain, the Eastern States and San Francisco is noticeable, and there is every probability that Canadian goods of every description will shortly capture the markets of the Province."

**Finances of Quebec.**

The Montreal "Gazette" says:—"The finances of this Province have been brought, under the administration of the Jolly Government, into even a more desperate condition than we had imagined possible in so short a time, if the report be correct that another \$500,000 loan has been negotiated in New York. We know that some three months ago the Government negotiated a \$3,000,000 loan in that market, and it was generally supposed that the proceeds would enable them to carry on the affairs of the Province for several months, but already this amount has apparently been exhausted, for a few days there has been transferred from New York to the credit of the Government at the Merchants' Bank in this city the sum of \$500,000, and this money is distinct from the recently negotiated loan."

**The Khedive's Abdication.**

The news of the abdication of the Khedive of Egypt at the demand of France and England will tend to relieve the minds of those who saw in the aspect of Egyptian affairs the prospect of future difficulties and complications for the great European powers. The Khedive was at one time regarded as an enlightened and progressive ruler, but his extravagance has proved ruinous to Egypt and the civilization of which he was supposed to be the representative, has proved to be but barbarism in disguise. His abdication has been brought about in consequence of his refusal to abide honestly by the engagements he entered into with regard to the financial affairs of Egypt, and will, no doubt, prove a great benefit to that country. It will also relieve the Sultan of the embarrassment of having a too powerful Viceroy, who was scarcely a subject, and who might at any time cast the weight of his influence against him in a European conflict.

**Sir Garnet's Appointment.**

The London correspondent of the Liverpool "Post" says that if what he hears be true, Sir Garnet Wolseley owes his new appointment to something like an official hurricane. Colonel Stanley received from Lord Chelmsford a pressing application for three more regiments to be despatched to the Cape immediately. The application coming from a commander who had already in the field 24,000 British troops, completely staggered Downing street. The Chancellor of the Exchequer, who will have to find the money for the war, was particularly oppressed by the demand and even the Prime Minister himself looked upon it as a poser. Sir Garnet Wolseley, who had arrived in London, was asked to take over the command. He assented and so energetically did the Government act that the appointment was made by the War Office without previous consultation with his Royal Highness the Commander-in-Chief. The whole thing seems to have been the work of a single morning. The energy and expedition which the Government manifested seem to have given general satisfaction.

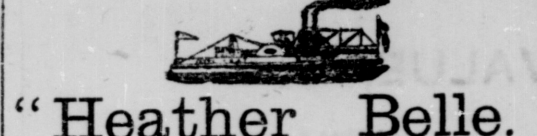
