METHODIST MISSIONS.

Women's Missionary Society Convenes at Sackville.

SACKVILLE, September 29.—The twelfth annual meeting of the Women's Missionary Society of the Prince Edward Island and New Brunswick Branch of the Methodist church convened at Sackville on Tuesday morning in the Methodist church.

About sixty delegates were present, coming from extreme points in New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island; Miss Palmer, of St. John, presided. One very important feature of the morning session, was the welcome and introduction of Miss E. Veasy, returned missionary from Japan. This session was devoted to routine work. Memorials were presented many of which were notices of motions from past board meetings. Centenary auxiliary presented a strong one in regard to the attitude of the present society towards Mrs. Large. Miss Palmer's presidential address was a forcible exhaustive review of the different mission fields and work of missionaries.

The treasurer, Mrs. Strong, reported the amount raised during the year to be \$5,921.94.

The corresponding secretary reported 77 auxiliaries—annual membership 1633.

The mission band corresponding secretary reported 56 bands with a membership of 1278.

A sumptuous tea was provided for the delegates in the schoolroom by the ladies of the church.

The public anniversary meeting held in the church was well attended. Mrs. Thomas D. Hart warmly welcomed the branch, which was gracefully responded to by Miss White of Charlottetown.

The chairman, Miss Palmer, briefly defined the reason for the existence and work of a woman's society.

Miss Veasy of St. Stephen, a Japan missionary, home on a furlough, gave an interesting address of the five years spent in that land. She dwelt upon the contradictory nature of its people, its climate subject to extremes of heat and cold, the methods of teaching foreign literature and Christian religion among the girls, the difficulties arising from ignorance and superstition. Every girl taking a full course in the school is thoroughly converted to Christianity before leaving.

The Mission Band banner was won by Miss Mellich, from Cogqueletza Band, Charlottetown. Miss Archibald, of Mount Allison, gave an able and eloquent address on the need and benefit of missionary work. Dr. Stewart spoke briefly, endorsing the society and urging its claims.

THE MONTHS RECORD.—During the month of September, ending yesterday, there were forty-two cases adjudicated upon by police Magistrate Haszard. A few days ago the matter was reported to the police, and they found a partially filled barrel of sugar in the house of a certain colored citizen, the barrel bearing the name of the firm from whom the sugar had been stolen. Yesterday forenoon a young man in the employ of the firm in question sent back word that he was ill and could not return to work, and he has not since been seen. This man had access to the warehouse in which the firm kept their stock, and he and the colored man were intimate. It is said that the colored man has for some time past been selling flour and sugar at his residence.
