The Life Underwriters' Association of Prince Edward Island had Messrs. G. J. Kotzimmyer of the Confederation Life, Toronto, A. Gordon Nairn, Secretary of the Life Underwriters' Association of Canada, and P. S. Fielding, Superintendent of Insurance in Prince Edward Island, as their guests at a dinner in the Canadian National Hotel on Friday.

Mr. H. W. Fletch, President of the Prince Edward Island Life Underwriters' Association, presided, Mr. G. J. Kotzimmyer in his talk "Approach and Shots" likened the selling of life insurance to the game of golf, in which one must get on the green with a good approach if he is to sink the ball.

There is also the value of providing for paying off a mortgage in the event of death, in order that a man's family may continue to enjoy the benefits of home should he die prematurely.

Mr. A. Gordon Nairn impressed upon the underwriters present the idea of selling insurance which provided for a certain definite income at maturity, rather than on a lump sum basis.

Returning again to the matter of the life underwriters' association, the speaker stated that the life underwriters have a wonderful opportunity of rendering a real service to the people of this country, and there was no way in which they could serve them better than in enabling them to provide an income for themselves and for their families.

Mr. P. S. Fielding, Superintendent of Life Insurance for the province, also spoke briefly, expressing his interest in insurance and thanking the underwriters and managers of the province for the co-operation which they had already given him during his term of office.

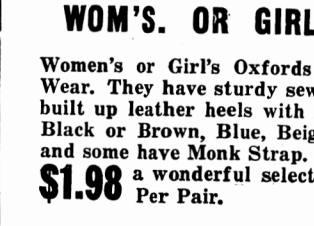
FATAL BOUT
