Queen Primrose, Real Fingo Win Double Dashes: Ann's Dream Upsets Favorites

Queen Primrose and Real Fingo were double race winners on last night's great card of racing witnessed by the largest crowd of the season at the Driving Park. Queen Primrose, driven by Claude O'Brien, won both heats of the D Pace followed to the wire by Laurel Chief and Marion E. in the first dash and in the second dash by Sleepy Sam and Laurel Chief. The brown mare set a new record of 2:17 for herself in the first and broke it again in the second with a mark of 2:16 2/5.

Real Fingo with Len O'Meara up squeezed through to a win over Feather Duster and Miss Mite in the first dash and the same two horses in the second, with Miss Mite finishing second and Feather Duster third.

In the free-for-all Ann's Dream upset the favorites, Bay State Pat and Sir Joseph, in the first dash and won by a length over the peoples' choices, who finished third and second. Ann's Dream paid \$17.30 to anyone who held a two dollar ticket on her.

It was a different story in the second stanza however, as Bay State Pat and Sir Joseph staged a race by themselves. Coming around the three-quarter pole the two horses began to run away from the field but on the first turn into the stretch the brown gelding with Roach McGregor driving, went on the run and Sir Joseph won by a length in 2:09 1/4, which was an exceptionally good time over the heavy track. Ann's Dream finished third.

Two other horses broke their records despite the heavy going; Bob Clegg in the first dash of the D Pace and Famous Boy in the second dash of the same class established new marks of 2:15 1/4 and 2:17 1/4 respectively.
