

### Coach Says Cleveland Browns May Not Repeat This Year

Brown says his National Football League champions are not likely to repeat this season because he has no adequate replacement for Otto Graham, his retired quarterback.

There aren't too many people in Cleveland or elsewhere who would give Brown an argument. Graham's talents have long been a source of joy to Cleveland's friends and of confusion to her foes. But it is a strange and wonderful day when Otto's coach admits it.

NEW YORK (AP) — Levee, three-year-old daughter of Hill Prince, defeated a field of 13 other fillies and mares Saturday in the \$66,700 Beldame Handicap at Belmont Park.

With Ray Broussard up, Levee outbattled Calumet Farm's Amoret in the stretch to win by half a length and earn \$46,100 for Mrs. Vernon G. Carby, former Montreal resident who now lives in New York. The victory boosted Levee's 1956 winnings to \$155,800.

The winner traveled the mile and one eighth in 1:50 on a fast track and paid \$19.70. Mrs. Ethel D. Jacobs' Searching was beaten by a head for second place with Woodland Farm's Blue Sparkler another neck away in fourth.

### Rangers Sign Paille To Replace Goalie Worsley

PROVIDENCE, R. I. (CP) — New York Rangers have signed Marcel Paille, Quebec Hockey League rookie, of the year last season, as a possible replacement for regular goaltender Lorne (Gump) Worsley.

General manager Muzz Patrick announced the signing of the 23-year-old goalie Saturday at the Rangers' training camp here.

"We got him because he wanted goaltending insurance," he said.

Rangers drafted Paille for \$10,000 last summer from Chicoutimi of the QHL.

Paille, Worsley and Johnny Bauer, the American League's most valuable player last season, have all been working out in the

nets since the Rangers pitched camp here 11 days ago.

Paille has been the most impressive in practice to date.

"He has many of the characteristics of Dave Kerr," Patrick said. "He's a stand-up goalie, he's got the angles well, he has good reflexes and he's cool."

Worsley, Rangers' regular goalie, underwent a knee operation at the end of the 1955-56 season. He is reported completely recovered. Bauer was a standout in the nets with Providence Reds.

### Nova Scotia May Have Own Senior Hockey League

HALIFAX (CP) — Nova Scotia may have its own senior hockey league this year, it was announced Saturday following an informal meeting of one Atlantic Coast Senior League team and two other clubs.

Amherst Ramblers of the ACSHL are "all set to go," representative Henry Shay said. New Glasgow and Halifax officials said they are interested in forming a provincial circuit if a fourth team can be found. Delegates reported Glace Bay and Dartmouth were also interested.

Last year's ACSHL, the only

senior league in the Maritimes, consisted of Moncton Hawks, Saint John Beavers, Amherst Ramblers and Fredericton Capitals.

Saint John was suspended as a result of a year-old dispute with Fredericton Capitals over gate receipts. Fredericton and Moncton have refused to play in the ACSHL this year if Halifax joins the circuit as proposed earlier. They said travelling expenses to the Nova Scotia port would make it impractical.

Moncton, Saint John and Fredericton had no representatives at the meeting here. Another meeting has been called for Amherst Sept. 30 when representatives from Moncton and Charlottetown will be invited to attend.

### Allsopp Breaks World Walking Record Saturday

MELBOURNE (Reuters) — Ted Allsopp, 32, shattered the world two-hour walking record Saturday by covering 16 miles, 401 yards in that time at Olympic Park here.

The previous record was 16 miles, 129 yards, by Russia's A. Vedjakov at Moscow last October.

The new mark was made despite a strong head wind and several heavy showers.

### Swim Coach Steve Mellors Fired For Public Statement

TORONTO (CP) — Swim coach Steve Mellors, who has guided Toronto swimmers entered in competition and in Lake Ontario marathon bids, was fired Friday.

Parks commissioner George Bell said Mellors was dropped as a civic employee because of public remarks criticizing the Canadian National Exhibition's Lake Ontario waterfront—used for swim races—as "indiscreetly filthy."

Mellors, who has been coach at the John Innes Community Centre, told a swim coaches meeting Thursday "I refuse to take responsibility for kids entering that water."

Mr. Bell said Friday: "I consider it irresponsible for a city employee to make public statements of this sort."

### Athletics Secure Duren In Player Deal With Orioles

KANSAS CITY (AP) — Kansas City Athletics Friday announced the acquisition of righthander Rindol George Duren from the Van cover club of the Pacific Coast League in one more step of an involved player trade with Baltimore Orioles.

The transaction started with the swap of catcher Hal Smith of Baltimore for catcher Joe Glass of Kansas City. Then the Athletics got outfielder Jim Pisoni from Vancouver.

The Orioles are to receive outfielder Al Pilarcik and pitcher Art Ceccarelli after the season closes

### To Discuss The Olympic Pledge

LONDON (Reuters) — The Marquess of Exeter, vice-president of the International Olympic Committee, said Thursday night he is willing to change the wording of a disputed Olympic pledge.

The marquess, president of the British Olympic Council, will attend an emergency meeting of the executive board of the International Olympic Committee Oct. 4 in Lausanne, Switzerland.

Discussion of the pledge is expected to hold a high place on the agenda.

The pledge requires Olympic competitors to promise not to take part in any sports.

The marquess said the intention of the IOC was to exclude from the Games all those who intended to use them as a steppingstone to a professional career.

"I know of one or two competitors who have openly stated that they wanted a gold medal so they could command a higher fee as a professional afterwards," he declared.

It is this sort of person the IOC wants to exclude, he said, although it cannot expect anyone to testify that some time after taking part in the Games he will not turn professional.

### National League Making Biggest Attendance

CINCINNATI (AP) — The National League is on its way to its biggest total attendance since 1950.

Through games of Wednesday, the loop had a total attendance of 8,183,427, President Warren Giles reported Friday. It needs only an average of 4,428 for each remaining game to surpass the 1950 total of 8,320,616.

The total, however, will be well below the 10,388,470 drawn in 1947 when baseball and all other sports profited by a post-war boom in attendance.

Milwaukee, Brooklyn and Cincinnati already have passed the 1,000,000 mark for this year and Milwaukee needs only 63,796 paid customers in its remaining game to reach 2,000,000.

### Italy Davis Cup Team In Shape To Meet Americans

FOREST HILLS, N.Y. (AP) — No lasagna and spaghetti for Italy's Davis Cup forces, and no late nights tripping the light fantastic with pretty Yankee belles.

"We may not beat the Americans, but it won't be through lack of condition," said Italy's tennis captain, Marquis Ferrante Cavriani, Monday. "This will be the toughest trained team we ever sent on a court."

The Italians meet captain Bill Talbert's U.S. team Friday, Saturday and Sunday here in the European-American zone semifinal. At stake is a trip to Australia to play India and then challenge the Aussies for the big trophy.

"We think we have a good chance, although the odds are with the Americans," Cavriani said. "One thing for certain — we'll be in shape."

Last year the Italians came here to play Australia in the zone final and became easy victims after gorging themselves on rich Italian food and partaking freely of American night life.

"This year we are following a rigid training schedule," the Italian captain, who wasn't the team leader in 1955, said.

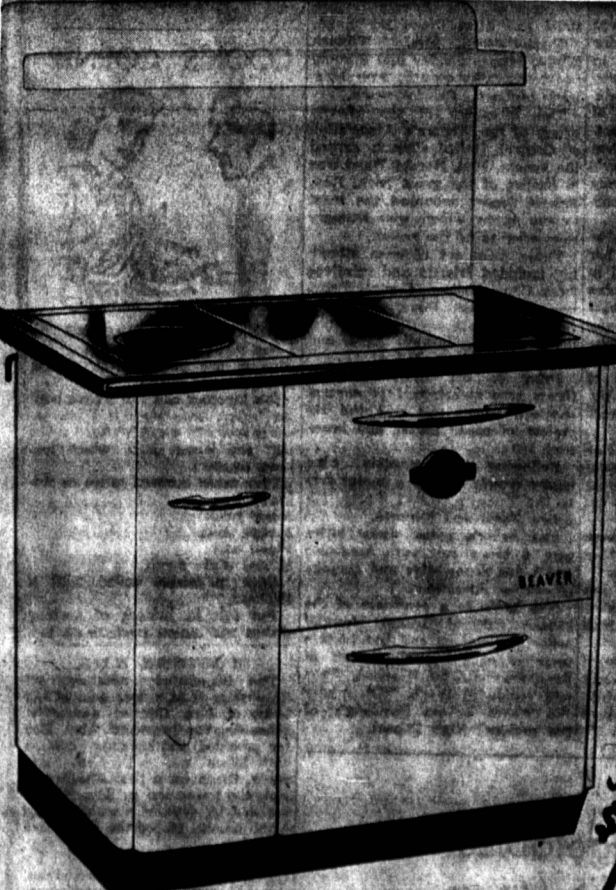
