Power Problem Faces Proposed Geo'town Plant

The possibility of establishing an artificial codfish drying plant at Georgetown is being investigated by a firm which has been operating a lobster cannery in the town this year. It is understood that a possible shortage of electric power to operate proposed machinery is one of the problems which must be overcome. At present the town is supplied by power by means of a submarine cable from Lower Montague and it is doubtful if enough power can be carried to supply the plant and take care of the town needs. Efforts are being made to have a new power supply taken to the town by a land line down the Georgetown Road. The submarine cable was laid years ago when power was supplied by a plant at Montague.

Representatives of the interested companies, Redmond Export Ltd., Halifax firm, met the Provincial Government this week and discussed power problems.

The Redmond company has taken over the cannery operated formerly by C. H. Llewellyn and Sons.

The proposed plant would produce and handle approximately all the cod caught for drying purposes. Under ordinary conditions the moisture content of cod does not admit of being satisfactory for shipment to many countries where markets exist. This is particularly true of those with a sub-tropical climate.

Mr. Gordon Jollimore and Mr. Raymond DeRoche are here at present for the Redmond Export Company, and the plant envisaged would provide employment for approximately 100 people.
