DIED IN JAIL.—Joseph Heckbert, undergoing punishment for bigamy, died in jail on Wednesday last. An inquest was held by Coroner Jenkins. By the evidence of Mr. Harvie, the jailer, it appears that the diet of the deceased was 7 pounds of hard bread, 1 3/4 lbs of oatmeal, and 3 gills of molasses per week. The jury returned the following verdict: "That the deceased came to his death from acute inflammation of the stomach, brought on by the use of improper food; and they are strongly of opinion that the ordinary jail diet is wholly insufficient to maintain a man for any length of time in good health, and we emphatically condemn the treatment of the prisoners in this respect."

Comment is needless. We trust that those concerned—wherever they are—will without delay introduce a change of diet for the prisoners.
