DOMINION PARLIAMENT

Summary of Proceedings.

OTTAWA, April 29. The Speaker took the chair at three o'clock.

On motion that the House go into committee of supply, Mr. Blake, in amendment, moved the following resolution:—"That it is expedient to provide means whereby, on solemn occasions touching the exercise of the power of disallowance or of the appellate power as to educational legislation, important questions of law or fact may be referred by the Executive to a high judicial tribunal for hearing and consideration in such mode that the authorities and parties interested may be represented, and that a reasoned opinion may be obtained for the information of the executive."

In support and explanation, Mr. Blake said that recent events had shown the necessity for such a reference as he had provided for. The Administration were now forced to come to judicial determinations on such subjects, but it could not be presented but in times of race and religious strife. Whatever decision they came to should be suspected to have been arrived at to allay popular feeling rather than be accepted as an impartial decision.

Sir John Macdonald complimented Mr. Blake upon the careful consideration of the matter manifested in the motion and in his speech in support. He announced that the resolution met with his entire approval. The decisions called for would not necessarily be binding, but rather for the information of the Government, and thus there was implied no interference with the principle of responsible Government.

The amendment was adopted unanimously. Mr. Eisenhauer brought up the question of the deposit of sawdust in navigable streams and this was discussed until six o'clock.

After recess the House went into Committee of Supply. On the item of \$40,000 for the P. E. I. Railway, Mr. Blake referred to a telegram sent by Sir Charles Tupper during the last general election to Dr. Weldon, of Alberta, promising to consolidate the branch lines of the lower Provinces with the main line of the Intercolonial.

Dr. Weldon rose and explained that he had on the faith of Sir Charles Tupper's promise, pressed the project upon his constituents, and urged the Government to follow the example of the C. P. R. and the G. T. R. and consolidate the branches, thus affording the people in the Lower Provinces the same advantages as are enjoyed by their brethren in the West. If the Intercolonial would not take the matter up he would promise the House to bring pressure to bear on the Government to give it to a commercial corporation would develop the country.

Sir John Macdonald added that the consolidation spoken of would result in some economy, though he doubted if it would reduce the deficit now experienced by the I. C. R. The matter, however, deserved full consideration, and he hoped Mr. Weldon would have an opportunity of bringing the matter up next year. As to the proposal to hand over the Intercolonial to a private company, he thought that if the Maritime Provinces were agreed by a vote of their legislatures or in any other way they could be recognized by the parliament of Canada. But parliament would not object till that was done. It was impossible to consider the subject, because the Intercolonial was one of the terms of Confederation, and it would be a breach of faith to part with that link between the Provinces. The discussion was kept up until 1.10, when the House adjourned.

Politics in Quebec.

MONTREAL, April 30.

The following comes from Quebec:—It is rumored that Hon. Mr. Chapleau will resign his seat in the Ottawa Cabinet, and take the leadership of the Conservative party in the Provincial. It is also said that Lieutenant-Governor Angers will resign. Col. Rhodes was Minister of Agriculture and the Protestant representative.

The Execution Stayed.

U. S. Circuit Judge Wallace has issued a writ of habeas corpus for Kemmler, returnable at Canandaigua in June, which stays the execution.
