

January Shoots Eagle To Win \$30,000 Tournament

DALLAS (AP) — Don January shot a dramatic eagle on the 18th green Sunday to win the \$30,000 Dallas centennial golf open with 268 for 72 holes.

The young Abilene, Tex., player, making his first tour, staged an uphill drive on the final round to score a three-under-par 67 and win the \$6,000 purse money by a stroke over Dow Finsterwald of Bedford Heights, Ohio, and Doug Ford of Mahoning, N.Y.

Finsterwald closed out with a one-under-par 69 while Ford shot a 67. Both earned \$2,700.

The three had started the day's final round with Finsterwald leading with 200, January second with 201 and Ford third with 202.

Al Balding of Toronto had a 71 Sunday for a final total of 281 while Jerry Kesseling of Kitchener, Ont., ended up with a 283.

Both had started out strong by scoring 66 in the opening round Thursday but neither matched that pace in succeeding rounds.

Stan Leonard of Lachute, Que., scored 69 in each of the first two rounds but dropped out Saturday after scoring a 41 on the first nine holes.

CARDINALS SWEEP DOUBLE BILL

Milwaukee Still Clings To N.L. Lead

Sparked by rookie Frank Torre's four straight hits, the Milwaukee Braves stubbornly clung to their hold in first place in the National League Sunday by defeating the Cincinnati Reds 7-2 in the rubber game of their three-game set.

The Braves needed the victory to stave off the onsurging St. Louis Cardinals, who swept both ends of a doubleheader from Chicago 11-9 and 12-2. The twin triumphs actually boosted the Redbirds a full game over Milwaukee.

The Braves, however, hold a percentage point lead, .640 to .529 because they have lost only nine games to the Cardinals' 13.

Rain curtailed the activity Sunday, washing out a scheduled double header between Pittsburgh and Philadelphia and single games between Brooklyn and Philadelphia and the New York Giants and Baltimore and the New York Yankees.

YANKS LEAD INTACT

The Yankees three and a half game lead in the American League remained intact as the Chicago

White Sox outlasted the second place Cleveland Indians 5-4 in a marathon first game that required four hours, 52 minutes and 15 innings to play.

Boston's third place Red Sox were held to a split by Washington with the Sox winning the first game 9-7 and the Senators taking the second game 11-10 in 10 innings. Kansas City also got a split with Detroit, winning the first game 5-0 and the Tigers had taken an 8-2 decision.

Torre, who replaced the slumping Joe Adcock at first base for the Braves a week ago, made three singles and a double, drove three victories against two defeats in one run and secured two. He now has a streak of five straight hits.

The Braves wrapped the game up early against loser Art Fowler but Lew Burdette, Milwaukee starter, needed help from Dave Jolly in the seventh to register his third victory against two defeats.

The Cardinals blasted out 27 hits, including five homers by Stan Musial and Ken Boyer, in their double win over the Cubs. They blew an early seven-run lead in the opener but fought back to win

as bonus baby Lindy McDaniel gained his fourth triumph with a nifty 4-2-3 inning relief chore. Musial drove in seven runs on four hits, including his sixth home run.

SIEVERS HOMERS

Roy Sievers' run-producing double in the 10th gave the Senators a split after the Red Sox had erupted for seven runs in the third inning to win the opener. Sievers, who acts as if he owns Fenway park, also homered in each game driving in five runs. In the four game series, he rapped nine hits in 16 times at bat, including four home runs, and drove in 10 runs.

Pitcher Jim Wilson, making his first appearance for the White Sox since he was acquired from Baltimore several days ago, won his own game with a two-out single in the 15th that drove in Minnie Miñoso with the winning run.

Dale Long, twice given the brush-off by Pittsburgh, broke a 34-year-old major league record Saturday by hitting his seventh homer in seven consecutive games to lead the Pirates to a 6-2 win over Philadelphia Phillies.

Long closed relief pitcher Ben Flowers' first pitch in the eighth

over the Pittsburgh wall to crack the six-homers-in-six-games mark set in 1922 by Ken Williams of St. Louis Browns and equalled three times since then.

After the game, Joe L. Brown, general manager of the Pirates, said he is going to tear up Long's contract and give him a new one immediately for more money. He didn't say how much Long is receiving now.

Milwaukee won a strange game from Cincinnati, winning 2-1 in the 11th after being held hitless for 9-2-3 innings by three Redlegs pitchers. The Braves got a single taking advantage of Johnny Klippstein's wildness. The Redlegs tied the score in the top of the ninth. In the 11th, Frank Torre, who had driven in the first Milwaukee run with a sacrifice fly, singled after Han Aaron had tripled for the winning run.

Brooklyn, with Roger Craig

pitching a three-hitter, belted New York Giants 6-0. The Dodgers had three homers, by Randy Jackson, who replaced Jackie Robinson when he suffered a knee injury making a turn at first base. Sandy Amoros and Carl Furillo. The Giants appeared listless without centerfielder Willie Mays who sat out the game after being hit on the face by a thrown ball in practice.

NBA Approves Fight Series To Decide Winner

BOSTON (AP)—The executive committee of the National Boxing Association Saturday approved an elimination series for the heavy weight title starting with the Hurricane Jackson-Floyd Patterson bout next month.

The committee decided the NBA would recognize as champion the winner of the three-bout series.

The winner of the Jackson-Patterson bout June 8 would meet light heavyweight champion Archie Moore, stopped by Rocky Marciano in the latter's last bout before retiring as heavy king.

The winner of that bout then would meet the fighter listed as No. 1 contender by the NBA for the title within 90 days. It was not decided what would happen if Jackson, Patterson or Moore become the No. 1 contender.

The executive committee said that next NBA ratings would be issued monthly, instead of quarterly.

COLLAPSES ON SIDEWALK

Baseball Hall-Of-Famer, Al Simmons, Dies At 54

MILWAUKEE (AP) — Al Simmons, whose batting feats with an odd foot in the bucket stance earned him a niche in baseball's Hall of Fame, died here early Saturday, four days after his 54th birthday.

One of the game's greatest right-handed-hitting outfielders, he collapsed on a sidewalk outside the Milwaukee athletic club where he lived in retirement and was dead on arrival at a hospital. Death was attributed to a heart attack.

Behind him Simmons left a score of memorable baseball achievements.

He had a lifetime major league batting average of .334 for 20 years, most of them for the 20s and 30s; won consecutive American League batting championships with marks of .361 in 1930 and .390 in 1931; and played in four world series with a cumulative batting average of .329.

Simmons was elected to baseball's Hall of Fame in 1953. His plaque at the Cooperstown, N. Y., shrine contains this brief rundown on his great career:

"Played with seven major league clubs 1924-1944. Star with Phila. (A. L.). Batted .308 to .392 from 1924 to 1934 — most hits by A. L. right-handed batter with 2,831. Led league runs batted in, runs scored, hits and total bases several seasons. Hit three home runs, July 15, 1932."

Simmons was born Aloysius Harry Szymanski in Milwaukee on May 22, 1902, the son of a Polish immigrant who died when Al was a boy.

He was found of recalling spring training of 1924 when he broke in with the Athletics at Fort Meyers, Fla.

Mack had bought him from Milwaukee Brewers for \$30,000. Simmons went up to the As with a

widely publicized ball player named Paul Strand, for whom Mack had shelled out \$75,000.

"It was Strand the fans wanted to see, not Simmons," Al recalled in later years. "I was just so much excess baggage."

Strand didn't last long, but Simmons went on to become a baseball immortal.
