

Mr. Secretary Pope invites us to go to his Deputy, who will show us, he says, the recorded copy of his (the Secretary's) Commission from the Queen. We have no desire to accept the invitation; we only know that the Royal Gazette never announced the receipt of Her Majesty's Sign Manual, confirming the appointment.

It is not true that a despatch signifying the Queen's confirmation of Mr. Pope's appointment, was read in the House of Assembly last Session, when Mr. Coles applied for the same. Col. Gray read a private letter, on that occasion, in which it was stated that the subject would receive attention at the Colonial Office.

Mr. Secretary Pope says if we will search his office we will find to discover any Commission, other than the provisional one, appointing Mr. Coles to the office of Secretary. It is hard to say what papers have left the office since Mr. Coles left it, and we doubt not our search would be a very fruitless one. But at all events there was no necessity for Mr. Coles's Commission to be left there; it was his own private property, for which he was, with the other officials, required to pay a fee to the persons authorized to receive the same in England. If Mr. Pope has any doubt, however, regarding the receipt of this Commission by Mr. Coles, he will have his doubt removed by turning to the Royal Gazette for Oct. 5, 1854, page 77, where he will find the proper notification of Her Majesty's Sign Manual in it is used, issued less than a month after his appointment.

COLONIAL.

A BAD MARKET FOR POTATOES.—The Halifax Evening Express of the 14th Nov. instants, has the following paragraph:—There is a large quantity of potatoes at present in market. A cargo sold yesterday at 6d. per bushel, and the same are being retailed at 9d.

There is much activity in the ship building business in St. John, N. B. This season. The news says that the ship yards now present a business-like appearance. In some of them two large ships at a time are under way, with lots of men at work about them; and we are informed that several more keels are to be laid immediately.

THE LIFE IN CANADA WEST.—The Montreal Herald does not draw a very flattering picture of life in some parts of Canada, when it makes the following remarks:—Unless prompt and energetic steps be adopted Canada West must ere long obtain a character for lawless and murderous ruffianism that would disgrace the most recently surveyed frontier of the territories of the neighboring Union. Day after day have we lately been called upon to record the perpetrations, too often with impunity, of the most diabolical crimes, of attempts to enforce lynch law and of partiality and extortion on the part of the local magistrates in Canada, and this morning we publish a perfect chapter of horrors, murders, poisonings, attempts to poison, incendiarism, and burglary. There can be no effect without a cause, and one of the causes of the hideous state of affairs, we think there can be no doubt, is to be found in the careless neglect, and more than careless abuse of their powers by the local magistracy.

UNITED STATES.

The Governor of South Carolina has sent a message to the Legislature, recommending, in view of the probable election of Lincoln, that they remain in session until the result is known, and that they then take such steps as will prepare South Carolina to meet the emergency. He thinks the only alternative left is the secession of South Carolina from the Union. He strongly recommends secession, and declares that no power on earth can rightfully prevent it. He also recommends that the military force of the State be reorganized, and that it be put in a position to be available at the shortest notice. He further recommends that the services of one thousand volunteers be immediately accepted.

HORRIBLE MURDER.—The *Realist* reports that a farmer says that a man named Vidler, of Bridgewater, killed his two daughters and a hammer on Tuesday morning, and then attempted to kill himself by cutting his throat. The wound was not deep, however, and he will probably recover. He is said to be in his right mind, and the cause for his killing his children, and then endeavouring to commit suicide, is not known.

EXPLOSION OF A STEAMER.—The *New Orleans Delta* gives a heart-rending account of the explosion of the steamer H. R. W. Hill:—At the time of the explosion there was a head of steam on varying from 120 to 125 pounds to the square inch, the usual power, but owing to the fact that below Australia Landing the boat struck the engine-room, it struck a hole in her hull, and she thereby affecting the boilers, the explosion may be conjectured. The engineer, however, told us that the boiler-head is made of cast iron, and it bears the mark of an old crack on the rim, where it was severed from the main boiler.

The after head of the boiler blew out, passing, with its contents (steam and water) entirely through the engine-room, killing the second engineer and the stoker, both of whom were on watch, and also killing some thirty or forty deck-hands and passengers, also badly wounding fifty or sixty more.

It was a melancholy spectacle to behold the white cabin of the Hill strewn with the wounded, dead and dying, and every person on board endeavouring to do his utmost to relieve the suffering of the unfortunate.

Some of the bodies were entirely skinned, and present a horrible sight, like highly colored Indians. Others are stripped of skin in various parts, presenting a fearful appearance.

A late number of the *New Orleans Bee* devotes a column to the local events of the day previous, which may be summed up by the headings:—Five men stabbed on the Sabbath; one dead and three dying; a man cut by his nephew; a horse-drawn woman's employer; a husband kills the man who insults his wife; accidental stabbing of a friend; a German actor turns a pretended murderer in reality.

THREE DAYS LATER FROM EUROPE. New York, Nov. 18.—Steamer Vanderbilt, from Southampton 7th, arrived at noon to-day. General Napier is dead.

The Piedmontese troops under Victor Emmanuel gained a brilliant victory on the 3d inst. on the Garigliani. They attacked the Bourbon army in front with their troops, flanked by the 4th and 5th divisions, the tents, wagons and stores of the enemy falling into Victor Emmanuel's possession, with 11,000 prisoners. Gen. Somaz pursued the enemy afterwards and occupied Mola and other positions commanding Gaeta. Victor Emmanuel was expected at Naples immediately.

Garibaldi was at Naples. Garibaldi resigned at Viterbo. Later telegrams from Shanghai say that the reported negotiations were not going on smoothly at Tien Sien. Chappel's large pianoforte factory in London had been burnt. Twenty persons were injured.

The telegraph cable to connect Singapore and Rangoon was about to be sent from England. It is 1300 miles in length.
