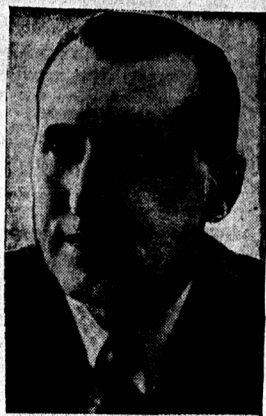


NEWS of the WORLD in PICTURES

It is announced that 52-year-old Dr. Mackinnon Phillips of Owen Sound, Ont., M.P.P. for Grey North has taken over the Ontario portfolio of health. He succeeds Hon. Russell T. Kelley, who has resigned due to illness. Dr. Phillips, a graduate of the University of Toronto and post-graduate of the Harper hospital at Detroit, has had both a distinguished and political career in Owen Sound.

Getting authentic stories straight from Bible Land as told by William Haddad is this group of Canadian children. Sunday School teaching methods will be on conference agenda.



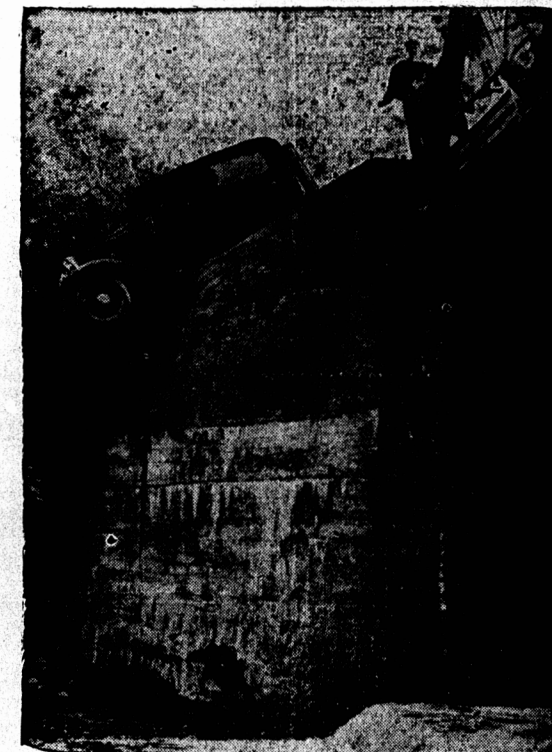
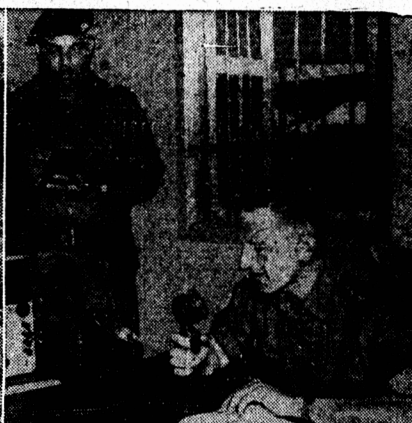

A few days ago, Timmy took his first steps. Timmy now rides his bicycle again and hikes up and down stairs in his parents' home in Willowdale, Ont. Harvey Bellman, 11, in real life, is shown with his arms around mother, the "best in the world" according to *Time*.



Three years ago Timmy was stricken with disease which crippled his hip joints and left both legs useless. Uphill fight was climaxed a few days ago when he found his legs would hold him.



Flanking Red spearheads jabbed within four miles of Masan (1), along a forty-five mile battlefield stretching northward from Masan, on the western perimeter of the shrinking American beachhead. Armored U. S. troops, however, unleashed strong new counter-blows, covering the retreat to the Nakdong river. Using newly-delivered heavy Sherman tanks, they slugged back east of Chinju, springboard for the main enemy push toward Pusan.
