ELLEN'S DIARY

Queen Ida Spent Her Days Well Tended And Happily

This noon it was, that a matrilarch of our cow-kind came to what with humans is sometimes called, "The end of the road." Queen Ida, this was, a member of an aristocracy, whose lineage is recorded in the annals of Canadian husbandry, its origin farther afield. She was a modest one, wore always plain but obviously good garb, in a favorite color mothered in all ten seasons and daughters in the years she was with us, and was seemingly well content with life on this farm... She enjoyed particularly, we would imagine, the summery days on the green of a pasture, when she interrupted her grazing to nurse the current small one who kept close to her skirts: sometimes too she would stop on a slope or upland range to look off to the gently blue - veiled skyline. And past the shimmer of sunshine down the slope, catch between the alders, the glint of the stream. She would also find the months of her stabling not unpleasant. James spoke of this today in a general way when he mentioned that a small company of girls in a pen under his care had made surprising growth through the winter.

"There's this to it, Ellen," he remarked, searching for a reason for this, "they weren't ever neglected. They never missed a meal." So she that was Queen Ida spent her days well tended and not unhappily we would say, until of late. We had word of this, having one morning overheard a conversation which ran like this between the farmers:

"Did she eat her grain this morning?"

"No. Oh, she may have taken a mouthful or so."

"But not with any relish?"

"No. No appetite for it."

"Did you offer her a warm mash?"

"Yes, but most of it was left in the pail."

"I reckon then she's about..."

"Oh well, she's old - come to the time," the other said in a low tone. "We're going to miss her - she's been around for so long."

A professional examination and diagnosis was not reassuring. Treatment could do nothing to extend the life - span, or delay the erosion of the years.

The parting came this noon... Partings are, after all, nothing new on a farm. And no animal dies, or none leaves the farm, but we in the family feel a tug at the heart-strings, even though we know this "change and decay" is a must of the farming. We also feel a regret over other changes made about.

So it was not strange when the news was brought in to us, that we recalled in mind, a day when in the course of their tending, our farmers decided to cut down the diseased cherry trees, that for years had stood at the foot of the garden. Nice things, those were: in spring crowned with bloom, in summer giving the family and the robins fruits, and bronzy - leaved when autumn brought the disrobings. They had put on their blossoms in a happy welcome at the birth of the one girl of the farm, and marked beautifully for her, threading them with birdsong, each returning anniversary. This noon, we remembered how tragic the expression was on the young face that afternoon when she returned from school to find a havoc wrought in her absence, and how sadly the tears fell. It was just as well, the thought came, that all the children were absent this noon, except Peter, not quite old enough in this instance to feel other than a passing regret.

A sunny day, this, of winter yet with spring leanings, the day Queen Ida a matrilarch of our cow-kind reached "the end of the road."

A Dozen Eggs Creamed To Team With Popovers

ENTERTAINING a large group soon for brunch or luncheon. Everyone will enjoy creamed eggs with or in popovers. They are fresh and pretty to look at, delectable in taste, easy-to, and low in calories, because non-fat dry milk crystals are used. Hard-cook and shell eggs the day before. Bake the popovers advance - even freeze them if you like ready to reheat.

To put together, make the sauce, heat the popovers in the oven, and serve the creamed eggs in or with them.

Measurements level

CREAMED EGGS FOR 12
1-3 c butter
1-3 c flour
1/2 tsp salt
1 tsp dry mustard
1/4 tsp pepper
3 c reliquied instant nonfat dry milk crystals according to pkg directions
12 hard-cooked eggs, sliced crosswise
1/4 c cooked green peas
1/4 c chopped canned pimientos
Popovers: home recipe or from a mix, or cornbread or toast

In large double-boiler top, melt butter. Mix in flour and seasonings. Gradually add reliquied instant milk crystals and stir over low heat until thickened. Carefully fold in eggs, peas and pimientos.

Cook 10 min over boiling water or until eggs are thoroughly heated. Serve in split-oven plain or cornmeal popovers, or accompanied with cornbread or toast.

MONDAY DINNER
Chopped Cabbage Salad with Caraway Seed-Sour Cream Dressing
Oven Braised Lamb Chops with Sliced Carrots, Onions, Green Beans and Whipped Potato Border
Raspberry (frozen or canned) Shortcake with Whipped Cream
Coffee, Tea Milk

THE CHEF HARD-COOKS EGGS
Mesdames: No "green rings" with this method. Use only grade "A" or "AA" eggs. Place the required number in a good-sized saucepan; entirely cover with cold water. Bring to boiling point. Boil rapidly only 10 min. from the time they start to boil. Chill in cold water.
