

Tobacco Crop Hit By Weather

DELHI, Ont., P(C) — Canada's largest tobacco crop in history, worth more than \$60,000,000, is endangered by continuing wet, cool weather, growers said Saturday. They said the weather has brought harvesting to a stop. G. H. Crozier, manager of the Imperial Tobacco plant here, said the leaves are staying green, still growing, and not ripening quick enough. "We need weeks of warm weather," he said. Mr. Crozier said the crop is about two weeks behind harvest schedule. He blamed a drought in July. This year, about 3,500 growers planted 117,000 acres. They will yield an estimated 150,000,000 pounds of tobacco. Previous crop record was 135,000,000 pounds.

Fishing Vessel Burns Off N. S.

HALIFAX (CP)—The RCAF reported Sunday the fishing vessel Dewey and David burned to the waterline and sank off the southern tip of Nova Scotia but all hands were rescued. The fire force said the tonnage and type of the Dewey and David was not known. Neither did a spokesman know how many persons were aboard the stricken vessel. The fishermen were taken aboard the 3,923-ton Norwegian freighter Elin Hope. They probably will be put ashore at the nearest port, Yarmouth.

EDINBURGH (CP) — James Stuart, secretary of state for Scotland, said 1953 had seen Scotland's industrial production running at a record level with volume up about one-fifth over the previous year.

U. S. Steel

CLEVELAND (AP)—The "back-adjusted" rate of steel production dropped another point last week to 63 per cent of rated capacity, the magazine Steel said Saturday. Discussing the slack pace of steel output, the weekly journal said that among steel consumers there are some notable exceptions to the general trend. Last week it pointed to the construction industry as still having a heavy backlog of demand. This week it described the oil and gas well drillers as "consistently good buyers of steel."

Other favorable factors cited by the magazine included a "slightly increased manufacturing level for farm equipment," and "the government program of shipbuilding."

New York Stocks

NEW YORK (AP)—The stock market ended last week at its highest level since the days of crisis in October, 1929, but as the bull market extended into its eighth consecutive month, there were scattered signs of diminishing vigor. Monday's market was the strongest of the week. Oils discovered support strong enough to carry railroads, utilities, steel and most of the rest of the market to new high ground.

Oils took over again Tuesday and were joined by motors. During the final hour, steel turned reactionary as E. T. Weir, chairman of National Steel Corporation said there is "very little prospect" of improvement in the steel industry.

PROFIT-TAKING STARTS SLIDE — That was the excuse necessary for many investors to take some of the profits accumulated over the past year. The resultant decline affected aircrafts, railroads, chemicals and most utilities. Motors and oils held firm. Wednesday and Thursday, there was much backing and filling as volume declined and interest centered on special situations.

Friday, the market climbed into new high ground, as measured by the Associated Press average of 60 stocks. Steels, aircrafts and gold mining issues led the way and railroads were coming on at the final gong. Volume was the lowest in nearly a month and the number of issues traded shrank to 1,172—smallest since July 2.

SEE RISE IN SPECULATIVES — Brokerage houses generally agreed that it was a week of consolidating gains. Medium and low-priced stocks of a speculative nature attracted more and more buyers. Most market analysts now claim that if strong demand develops for these secondary issues, it will provide the basis for a new advance by the market's traditional leaders.

The five most active issues this week were Packard up 1/4 at 2 1/2.
