HALIFAX, (CP)—Halifax Atlantics increased their Maritime Major Hockey League lead Saturday, defeating the second-place Charlottetown Islanders 5-4 in a game that lacked the usual fireworks...

A paid crowd of 5,385 saw the Atlantics play in spurts against the Islanders who dressed only 11 men, one a junior, because of injuries.

The Island schoolboy curlers, who made a very strong showing in the Dominion-wide competitions held last week at Saskatoon, Saskatchewan, returned to Charlottetown on Saturday morning after compiling a 3-6 record during the week's play.

SKIP Barry MacDonald and his rink mates Dave Reardon, Brewer Auld and Roger Partridge had nothing but the highest praise for the officials who conducted the tournament and for the way in which they were treated while in Saskatoon.

The many friends of Mr. Harry G. Jenkins will deeply regret his sudden passing in the French Hospital, New York City early Sunday morning, although not in good health for some time his death was unexpected and came as a great shock to his family and friends.

Mr. Jenkins was the son of the late Dr. Stephen Rice Jenkins and Mrs. Jenkins of Charlottetown. He leaves to mourn two brothers, Dr. Jack Jenkins of Charlottetown, and Charles Jenkins of Devon, England and six sisters, Mrs. Ivan Reddin and Miss Helen Jenkins of Calgary, Mrs. Linn Parish of Woodland, California, Miss Hilda Jenkins of Compton, Quebec, Mrs. Edward O'Brien of Ottawa and Mrs. Fred Taylor of Bimbury.

Leonard "Snip" Kelly, aged about 25, who moved from Kensington to Summerside about one week ago, was seriously injured last evening about 6:30 p.m. in an automobile accident on Water Street, West in Summerside when the car in which he was riding came in contact with a telephone pole.

He was taken by ambulance to the Prince County Hospital where Dr. W. E. Callaghan, the attending physician, described his condition as dangerous.

Kelly was found on the ground a few feet from the car, but another man, presumably the driver, was observed to have climbed out of the wrecked car and hastily leave the scene of the accident.

Summerside police investigated the accident and later arrested a Summerside man, who is believed to have been connected with the incident.

TUESDAY

The condition of Leonard Kelly, of Summerside, who was badly injured in an automobile accident at Summerside Sunday evening, was reported last night as being somewhat improved.

Kelly is a patient in the Prince County Hospital as the result of an accident in which the car in which he was driving struck a telephone pole on Water Street West early Sunday evening.

His injuries include a fractured skull, and compound fracture of the right arm.

The Charlottetown Islanders moved back to within nine points of the League leading Halifax Atlantics last night as opportunistic "Buck" Whitlock scored on a 20 foot shot with two minutes left in the game to give the Islanders a 4-3 win over the Haligonians in a game at the Forum.

Whitlock's goal, his second of the night, broke up a hard fought game in which Islanders enjoyed a wide margin on the play but displayed poor marksmanship around the Halifax cage.

Twice during the first period the Islanders went out front but each time the Atlantics bounced back to tie it up. The Haligonians drew first blood in the second period and this time the Islanders came back to even matters before the session ended.

WEDNESDAY

Mixed curling teams from Charlottetown and Summerside met last night in exhibition matches at the Charlottetown Curling Club and the results of the games showed the Charlottetown rinks with five wins against three for the visitors.

Charlottetown rinks skipped by Ed Tanton, Art Roper, C. MacDonald, Dr. E. S. Giddings, and Andy Likely won their matches while the Summerside rinks, skipped by Parker Crockett, J. McGregor and R. MacFarlane.

Mr. Philip Dumaresq, Halifax, the Nova Scotia representative on the national board of the Community Planning Association was the guest speaker last evening at the first supper meeting of the Summerside Community Planning unit, recently organized in Summerside.

Mr. Dumaresq, after expressing his pleasure at being present to address the Summerside group, gave a most interesting and informative talk on community planning. He dealt with the many problems which had arisen in his home group in Halifax and what they are doing to solve these problems.

Other speakers at last night's meeting were Dr. P. A. Creelman, chairman of the Charlottetown board who had many valuable suggestions to offer, Mr. Robert Car-

ruthers, representing the Kensington Association, who spoke of his interest in this work and of the progress being made in his town, and Mr. Charles Smith, president of the Prince Edward Island Division of the Community Planning Association, who introduced the guest speaker and also answered many questions, which arose regarding community planning.

At the conclusion of the meeting a question and answer period was held.

A check with several potato dealers Summerside revealed that due to low prices and an uncertain market, all shipment of potatoes from this area has slowed to a virtual standstill.

Most dealers felt that the cause of the present situation was due to the shipment, or threat of shipment, of potatoes from Maine to Montreal and Toronto markets.

One dealer felt that the Potato Marketing Board was largely to blame for keeping the minimum price higher than the market would allow.

At the present time however, most dealers would rather not handle any potatoes because they would have to do so at prices less than the prices set by the potato marketing board, and at prices unsatisfactory to the farmer.—S.

A new annual scholarship has been made available by Queen's University to graduates of Prince of Wales College to be known as "The W. E. McNeill Scholarship", in honour of Dr. William Everett McNeill, a distinguished alumnus of Prince of Wales who for many years was Vice Principal of Queen's.

One scholarship will be awarded each year to a graduate of Prince of Wales who has maintained distinguished standing in the third and fourth years and who is recommended by the Principal. The scholarship may be held in any faculty of Queen's University. It includes full tuition and \$100 in cash for as many as three years.

If held in the Faculty of Arts, the total value may be as much as \$960; in the Faculty of Applied Science \$1320; in the Faculty of Medicine \$1395.

THURSDAY

HALIFAX, (CP)—Charlottetown Islanders, short-handed and tired but fighting to the end, scored in overtime to down Halifax Atlantics 4-3 in a Maritime Major Hockey League game Wednesday night.

The win brought the Islanders within seven points of the front-running Atlantics.

The Islanders won the hard way. Trailing in the first and third periods, they scored in the dying minutes of the third to send the game into overtime.

A grass fire got out of control Monday evening and destroyed a large barn belonging to Richard Westwood, Albion. The barn was filled with machinery and a quantity of hay and oats which was also lost.

The fire then ran to the shore threatening two fishing boats belonging to Ambrose Jessome and Ernest Griffin. The boats, however, were undamaged.

Elimination of the sharp corner at Bedeque will permit the proposed new highway from Summerside to connect with the Trans Canada Highway in a straight line. This will be done through the co-operation of Mr. E. H. Strong, Summerside, who owns a home at the former turn. He has agreed to move the house to allow the highway to go through.

After leaving Bedeque the road will follow the Middleton Road to the intersection of the Arnett Road and on to the union with the Trans Canada Highway near Albany. It is expected that much of the preparatory work will be done on the new route this summer.

Captain John Skerry, age 77, a lifelong resident of Alberton South, passed away early Wednesday morning following a long period of ill health. During his years of active life he had sailed a schooner out of Alberton.

Surviving are his wife, the former, Eliza Schirder of Canoe, N.S., three sons and two daughters: Roy of Alberton South; Dorothy at home; Myrie at Alma; Erskine at home; and Mrs. Archibald Fraser (Reta) of Alberton South; another son, Ralph, was killed on active service in World War Two. Also surviving are the following brothers and sisters: Robert at Freeland; Thomas at Tyne Valley; Howard at Alberton and Frank serving aboard the Saurel; Mrs. Edward Lewis (Mary) of Cascumpec; Mrs. Austin Murphy (Janie).

Alberton; and Mrs. Wansley Lewis (Gertrude), Halifax.

The taking over by the Island Co-op Services of the dairy and poultry business operated here for several years past by Swift Canadian Company was announced last night. Included are the egg grading station, poultry killing plant and chick hatchery.

Swift Canadian Company will continue to purchase butter, eggs and poultry processed in the plants, and will carry on with its buying of cattle, calves, sheep, lambs and hogs through its own buying station.

The Island Co-op Services expect to start operations of the egg station and poultry killing plant on Fitzroy street early next month and it is believed that all the offices will be moved to the new location. The chick hatchery will start operating immediately to meet the seasonal demand.

"If market conditions can be stabilized there are still possibilities for improvement before the end of the season," Mr. Donald A. MacDonald, manager of the P.E.I. Potato Marketing Board, said on his return from a visit to Canadian and United States centres.

Mr. MacDonald has spent several days in Montreal, Toronto, Ottawa, Windsor and Detroit and noted that in the latter city Idaho potatoes were retailing for 79 cents for a ten-pound bag. However, he also saw that the Maine potatoes, entering Canada mainly by truck, are being sold on the Montreal market, but not in such quantities as our local growers have been led to believe.

Island potatoes still control the Toronto market, but Mr. MacDonald saw the locally grown potatoes were being delivered by truck direct to retail stores for as low as \$1.00 per bag.

FRIDAY

Announcement was made yesterday, following a meeting of managers of the five banking institutions in Charlottetown, that commencing March 2 a Bank Clearing House will be established for the Province. A board of directors composed of the five local managers has been selected, headed by W. R. Cruikshank, manager of the Royal Bank of Canada, as chairman.

Mr. W. Read, accountant of the local branch of the Provincial Bank of Canada, has been chosen as Clearing House manager for the first six months. The Provincial Bank, therefore, will be clearing house headquarters while Mr. Read acts as manager.

A number of retail merchants of Summerside met last evening in the Town Hall for the purpose of forming a retail merchants association. In the absence of Mr. Alan Holman, president of the Board of Trade, Mr. Ross MacKenzie acted as chairman, and outlined the aims and objectives of such an association.

The following were appointed as a nominating committee to bring in a slate of officers at a meeting to be held in the near future and also to gather all available information on the formation of a retail merchants association: Ross MacKenzie, chairman; J. C. Mountain, Dick Henthorn, Brenton MacLean, Melchior Wedge, Roy Boates, George Clarke, Stanley Dawson, Edward Smith and Allan Holman.

A sharp increase in the number of rural subscribers from 285 in 1947 to 760 last year was pointed out in the brief filed yesterday on behalf of the Town of Summerside before the Public Utilities Commission. The Town is seeking an increase in rates on electricity supplied by its plant to rural users.

The Commission, with Judge C. St. Clair Trainor presiding, heard considerable argument between opposing counsel regarding the "hook up" charge of \$150 and the possibility of this being refunded to the consumers. Mr. H. Frank McPhee, Q.C., appearing for the Town of Summerside, maintained that the town plant has been losing money on its rural operations despite the fact the consumers are willing to pay more for the service. He thought this should be considered as a factor in any decision regarding rates which the Commission might reach.

"In life it is judgment that is more important than facts," Dr. R. C. Wallace, retired principal of Queen's University, said last night.

he delivered the fourth annual Samuel Robertson Memorial Lecture at Prince of Wales College. Dr. Wallace pointed the way to a highly interested audience that while it is easy to learn facts, or at least learn where to obtain them, it is difficult to possess oneself of sound judgment. He was speaking on the general theme of "Education for Living", and reminded his listeners that a mind has to be disciplined by hard training.

With traces of a soft Scotch burr in his voice Dr. Wallace frequently referred to his native heath and told several mirth-provoking stories about it.

In his opening remarks Mr. MacKinnon spoke briefly of the late Dr. Samuel Robertson, long-time teacher and principal of the college. He said that the outstanding thing about the late educationist was his strength of character which he was able to pass on to his students and made him a figure long to be remembered in college life.
