RUSSIA AND BRITAIN

The Powers Combining to Bind Asunder the British Empire.

New York, October 13.—According to the London correspondent of the Sun, matters in the Far East are looking very dark for Lord Salisbury and the British Empire.

After referring to Lord Salisbury's "uncasiness," and what is going on in the "inner circles," the correspondent states that "the British Government is fully alive now to the fact that British interests throughout the Far East are vitally imperilled, and England is virtually powerless to resist the combination for her undoing, which has been preparing among the Continental Powers."

There comes, curiously enough, just at this time, a highly interesting confirmation of the general plans which Prince Lobanoff entertained for the overthrow of British supremacy, and which I described in the Sun at the time of the death of that statesman.

On the other hand, an alliance with France affords Russia security against Germany. Prince Lobanoff made light of an Austro-German entente in that he thought it possible that Austria Hungary might eventually recover her position in Germany, which would seem to indicate that he had in view a rapprochement between the dual monarchy and France, for without the aid of the latter such a project could never have formed a part of his calculations.

Whether this is a correct outline of Prince Lobanoff's ideas or not, it is certain that the Russian policy was implacably anti-British then and is now.
