## UNEMPLOYMENT INSURANCE

The recent debate in the Legislature on the Unemployment Insurance resolution and subsequent newspaper reports convey the impression that the Federation of Agriculture objects to or is uninterested in unemployment insurance for farm workers. Such is not the case as the Federation has had a special committee studying for three years the application of unemployment insurance to farm workers.

The Federation's conclusion from this study is that the general application of unemployment insurance on a compulsory basis would be unpopular with farmers and a problem in administration by the commission.

Until a year ago the Federation had been recommending that insurance be made available on an optional basis so far as the farm employer was concerned. This recommendation was based on the belief that farmers re-

quiring seasonal help would automatically find it necessary to provide stamps. However, the Commission no doubt felt that the voluntary basis would result in a high percentage of poor risks. As stated in the brief to the Members of the Legislature the Federation policy on unemployment insurance is that it should be made available to workers in any branch of agriculture which can be clearly defined by nature of the production or otherwise and where a well established demand exists for the service.

The Federation is not opposed to insurance for farm workers but it does question the wisdom of a compulsory application across the industry, believing that there are situations where disadvantages will develop so far as the farmer is concerned.

**FEDERATION LOBBY**

In the February 28 issue of MacLean's magazine, Blair Fraser under the heading of "Facts and Myths about Lobbies," discusses the attempts by various organizations to exert influence on Government. A reference of interest to agriculture is quoted below:

"Of course it is the special strength of groups like these, that they have no direct material interest in the case or actions they urge. However, this cannot be said about another powerful lobby, perhaps the best of them all, the Canadian Federation of Agriculture. CFA President, H. H. Hannam is out to get the best deal he possibly can for the Canadian farmer, and to that end he maintains very close and friendly relations with the federal Department of Agriculture. The same attempt is made in the appropriate places, though rather less successfully by the Canadian Labour Congress, the Canadian Manufacturers' Association, the Canadian Chamber of Commerce, indeed by most of the thirty-odd national associations to be found in the yellow pages of the Ottawa telephone book. There are many others like them in Toronto and Montreal."

**SIXTIETH ANNIVERSARY**

Arrangements are practically now completed for the holding of the Dairyfarmers' Association sixtieth anniversary banquet on Wednesday, March 18 in the Charlottetown Hotel. The feature attraction will of course be the guest speaker, the Hon. Douglas S. Harkness, Minister of Agriculture for Canada. Other features of the program will be musical entertainment, presentation of Association prizes, introduction of past presidents and Secretaries, a citation for service to the dairy industry, a brief history of the Association, greetings from the Dairy Farmers of Canada and the Canadian Federation of Agriculture and from civic and Government officials. All in all indications are that the night of March 18 will be a feature occasion in the history of the Prince Edward Island Dairy industry.
