MacPhail Park Is Certain Now

Negotiations have been completed and Mrs. Lionel Lindsay has agreed, effective Aug. 15, to give possession of the property of her father, the late Sir Andrew MacPhail, at Orwell. The date was agreed on in the event that final documents have been signed by that time.

Premier Matheson said the Province of Prince Edward Island has accepted Mrs. Lindsay's gift and development of the park, including clearing away of trees, etc. will be started by provincial foresters immediately.

He said the government was happy to agree with the terms of Mrs. Lindsay's handing over of the property. Among these was her desire to see the home of her father and surrounding area restored and used as a park for all the Island and its visitors.

This is the fifth provincial park that the Island government has acquired either through donation or purchase of the site. The Premier said full details regarding the development of the park have not been worked out but he felt it had many possibilities as a picnic grounds, a fishing spot and possibly a wild life game sanctuary.

The property consisting of approximately 240 acres is ideally situated for park purposes. Mrs. Lindsay made the proposal to the Island government some time ago. Her main desire is that the dignity and quiet loveliness of the woods and stream be preserved as a memorial to her late father, who was born on the farm and in the later years of life used it as a summer home.

Accident Loss Is Decreased

OTTAWA (CP) — Loss from traffic accidents in 1958 was \$3,000,000 less than the estimated loss in 1957.

The Canadian Highway Traffic Conference reported today a total loss through accidents last year of \$313,400,000, down from \$321,600,000 in 1957.

The conference bases its estimate on an arbitrary figure of \$100,000 representing economic loss for each fatal accident. This is a statistical figure that includes loss through injuries and property damage.

The breakdown by provinces, with 1957 losses in brackets: Newfoundland, \$4,700,000 (\$4,300,000); Prince Edward Island, \$2,000,000 (\$1,100,000); Nova Scotia, \$16,100,000 (\$14,100,000); New Brunswick, \$13,900,000 (\$13,700,000); Quebec, \$82,100,000 (\$87,100,000); Ontario, \$111,200,000 (\$127,900,000); Manitoba, \$12,200,000 (\$12,700,000); Saskatchewan, \$13,300,000 (\$13,500,000); Alberta, \$29,500,000 (\$21,700,000); British Columbia, \$28,200,000 (\$25,100,000); Yukon, Northwest Territories, \$100,000 (\$400,000).

SUMMERSIDE — The case against Reginald Poirier charged with stealing lobsters from the firm of Arsenault and Desjardins, Summerside, Thursday night was dismissed for lack of evidence in police court yesterday afternoon by Magistrate R. S. Hinton, Q.C.

Poirier was charged after being apprehended about 11.30 Thursday night near the factory which had been broken into according to testimony.

Const. Harry MacKay told the court he found Poirier about 10 feet away from a door of the factory which had been broken open and that he saw lobsters fall or be thrown from his person. He told the court he found four lobsters on the ground near the accused.

Const. Stewart Berry corroborated Const. MacKay's evidence.

Peanut Butter Cupcakes

1/2 cup fat
1/2 cup Schwartz Vibracreamed Peanut Butter
1 teaspoon Schwartz vanilla
1 1/2 cups brown sugar
2 eggs yolk, plus 1 egg
2 cups sifted flour

1/2 teaspoon salt
2 teaspoons baking powder
1 cup milk
Meringue (see below)
1/2 cup chopped peanuts

Blend fat, peanut butter, and vanilla. Gradually add 1 cup of the sugar, creaming until light and fluffy. Beat eggs together and add sugar. Sift dry ingredients together and add alternately with milk to the peanut butter mixture. Put batter in lightly greased muffin pans, cover with meringue, and sprinkle with chopped peanuts. Bake in a moderate oven (350° F.) about 25 minutes. Makes 18 to 24 cupcakes.

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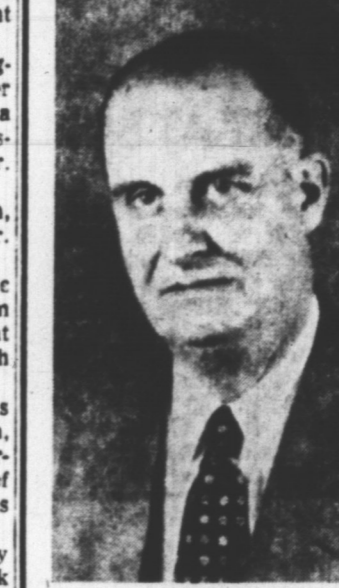

Alberton Children Take Part In Vocation Rally, Pageant

ALBERTON — Some 50 children of those attending the annual Catechetical school in Sacred Heart Church, Alberton, took part in a vocation rally and missionary pageant.

Rev. E. Doyle, C.S.S.R., Charlottetown, was in charge assisted by Sisters Mary Ida, Mary Rose and Lucia Ann, of the Congregation of St. Martha.
