

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.
CANADIAN.

OTTAWA, Dec. 6.
Mark Twain is to be given a complimentary banquet in Montreal.
The Ministers of the Crown, with the exception of Sir Charles Tupper and Hon. J. C. Pope, are in the city.
The Customs officials who made the recent seizure of oil at Prescott were burned in effigy last night amid great excitement.

The new semaphores invented by Mr. Gibberne, superintendent of the signal service, have been tested and pronounced a success.
Mr. Henri, of Hamilton, says the article in the Toronto "Telegram" on the railway fusion is utterly untrue in so far as the Northern and Northwestern railways are concerned.

The Senecal-foote libel case, the preliminary investigation into which was to have proceeded yesterday, has been suddenly terminated; the case having been settled by Mr. Foote agreeing to apologise.
It is now intimated by the Grit press that the remnants of the Quebec opposition intend resigning. Hon. Mr. Mercier has already intimated his intention of doing so and the others will follow. It is said that Mr. Stephens is the only one who seriously objects.

An adjourned sitting of the Supreme Court will be held on Wednesday next, for the hearing of Ontario cases. The petitions on the part of the temperance advocates in St. John, N. B., city and county, to have votes taken in these districts for bidding the sale of liquor under the Scott Act have upon objections which were filed on behalf of the opponents of such act by Messrs. Cockburn and McIntyre, been disallowed.

ST. JOHN, Dec. 6.
By the falling this afternoon of the basement ruins of St. Mary's Church School-house, on Waterloo Street, burned some ten days ago, three boys aged from 10 to 12 years, were killed. Their parents reside near by, and the children were picking up firewood in the ruins. An inquest will be held to-morrow; also a rigid inquiry, as the affair was a dangerous trap.

UNITED STATES.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 6.
The President's message was transmitted to Congress to-day. The message opens with a touching reference to the death of President Garfield, in consequence of which Gen. Arthur became President. The work of the different departments is reviewed at length, and recommendations of the secretary of the treasury, as to finances are indorsed. A revision of the tariff is recommended; and that the people may have just relief from the present onerous taxation, except upon taxes in its various forms, and upon distilled spirits and fermented liquors; and except also the special tax upon manufacturers of, and dealers in, such articles, is suggested. The amicability of foreign relations, the proposed Panama Canal and the South American trouble were noticed. The message favored the idea of increasing the army, and retreating the navy. The necessity of legislation for the suppression of polygamy was urged. After the civil service and several matters of minor importance had been mentioned the President concluded by saying: "I am deeply impressed with the gravity of the responsibilities which have devolved so unexpectedly upon me. It will be my constant purpose to co-operate with you in such measures as will promote the glory of the country and the prosperity of its people."
The comments of the local press upon the President's message are most favorable; and it is generally conceded to be a careful and well written document.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 6.
Information has been received here of the death of General Kilpatrick, Minister to Chili. [General Kilpatrick was a distinguished officer in the Civil War.]

NEW YORK, Dec. 6.
Jeff Davis is reported as being one of the overdue steamers from Liverpool. It is now stated that President Arthur will not testify in the Guiteau case.

EUROPEAN.
LONDON, Dec. 6.
The Marquis of Lorne will sail for Canada, Jan. 11th.

CAIRO, Dec. 6.
The report of an affray between Arabic Bay and M. De Buejiries, is utterly unfounded.

DUBLIN, Dec. 6.
At a meeting of the Ladies Land League to-day it was announced that £1,161 had been received during the past week. It is also stated that £200,000 has been received from Mr. Egan since the 4th of October.

LONDON, Dec. 4.
The steamer "Boliva," which sailed from London Nov. 19 for Boston, with 109 passengers, has taken refuge at Queenstown. She lost her funnel and four boats, had a sky-light smashed, and sustained other damages. The third engineer was killed and two firemen were scalded. She will proceed to Glasgow.

LONDON, Dec. 6.
The Times Dublin despatch says the Land League is being openly re-organized, under the name of "The Political Prisoners Aid Society." Several meetings of this new organization were held on Sunday in the neighborhood of Dublin.

ALEXANDRIA, Dec. 5.
An Arabic Bey, the leader of the late military emente, abused and struck M. De Bligniere, controller of the government for France on the street in Cairo to-day. Great excitement prevails and another revolt is expected.

LONDON, Dec. 6.
It is understood that John Dillon is about to be released from prison.

LONDON, Dec. 5.
It is probable that Gen. Sir Evelyn Wood will be appointed Governor of Natal.
