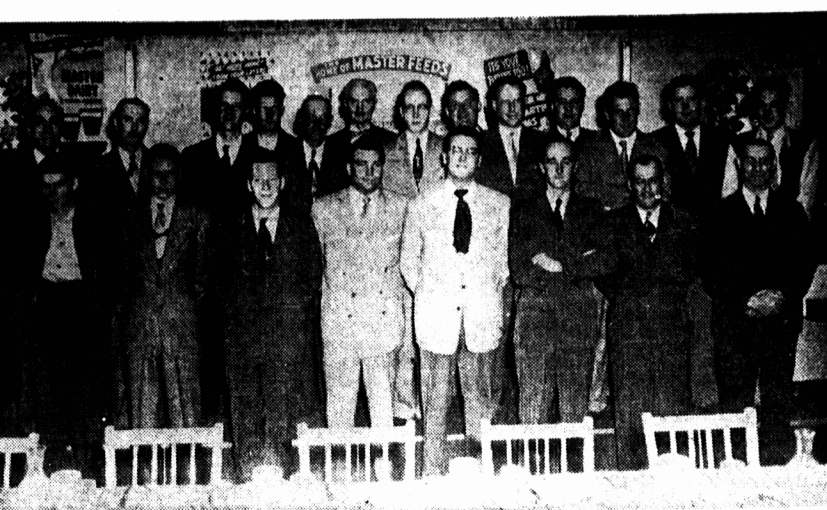

They thought of the first accurate new world calendar, with a year like ours made up of 365 days. But their calendar had 18 months of 20 days each and one month of 5 days.

They were the first to tap maple trees and boil their sap into maple sugar.

They cultivated a hybrid corn—red, violet, and white—the result of a curious phenomenon known as Xenia, centuries before other farmers ever thought of such a thing.

They used the first straight razors for shaving. These were leaf or grass razors and were as sharp and fast cutting as any steel blade sold today.

They were the first to cultivate and use tobacco.

They were the first to discover refrigeration, used by the barrel cactus to store cool water.

They were the first teachers of conservative methods on this continent.
