

Reports Boost In Student Aid Is "Real Necessity"

TORONTO (CP) — A great increase in scholarship, bursary and loan funds for university students is a real necessity, says a report issued Wednesday by the Industrial Foundation on Education.

The report suggests industry and commerce establish a loan fund and that a scholarship fund be set up on a national competitive basis.

The 77-page report states much more information is required but from foundation studies it had learned that students finance about 60 per cent of their own expenses and family aid finances 22.5 per cent.

The total value of all fellowships, scholarships, assistantships and loans is \$10,031,600 made up of \$7,450,950 in fellowships and \$2,580,650 in scholarships, assistantships \$239,100; prizes \$32,750.

The \$7,450,950 in fellowships and scholarships breaks down like this:

Government \$4,464,050; industry and commerce \$1,009,300; private individuals \$787,060; universities \$368,850; institutions (including fraternal societies, religious groups, women's and men's clubs and professional societies)

\$364,850; alumni \$57,850; other \$407,990.

From \$50 to \$1,000

Awards range from \$50 to more than \$1,000, and 91.1 per cent of undergraduate and 84.2 per cent of graduate awards are for one year only.

Awards account for a low of 26.9 per cent of basic costs in Quebec and a high of 97.1 per cent in Newfoundland; and the percentage of undergraduate students assisted ranges from 8.1 per cent in Saskatchewan to 41.6 per cent in Newfoundland.

The report says a major consideration is whether it is reasonable to expect students to provide over 60 per cent of their income themselves, and adds:

"A cursory examination indicates that it is not. About 46 per cent is provided in the United States from student earnings and savings. Many plans now are being formulated which will, no doubt, reduce this still further."

"As an interim measure it is suggested that industry and commerce establish a loan fund which could be centralized under the control of the industrial foundation on education, and from which all properly-qualified educational institutions in Canada could draw when it was established that a need existed, and that talent would be wasted if the need were not satisfied."

"Loans would be interest-free until the student graduates and then bear interest at a rate to pay only for the administration of the fund—possibly three per cent."

"The answer to our problem does not lie in making college education free to everyone who wishes to attend, but in making it possible for everyone who is qualified and motivated to obtain a college education, to attend."

"For students who have graduated from secondary schools but have not received a sufficiently high grading to merit a scholarship, there should be ample bursary and loan funds to make it possible for them to complete their education without financial worry."

"Referring to student part-time work, the report says it can be beneficial but if it is disagreeable and exhausting it may impede the student's progress."

The foundation is an outgrowth of the national conference on engineering, scientific and technical manpower held at St. Andrew's N.B., in September, 1956, under the sponsorship of business and industry.

Grand Jury Sees Institutions Generally In Need Of Repair

The report submitted by the Grand Jury, to Mr. Justice George J. Tweedy, Tuesday evening, indicated that the jurors were of the opinion that the majority of public institutions visited are in a bad state of repair. It urged upon those responsible that steps be taken to remedy these defects at an early date.

The only sections of the report containing favorable comment were those dealing with Riverside Hospital and Beach Grove.

The report was submitted by the foreman, W.J. Brown. Other members of the Grand Jury were: Arthur MacInnis, Jr., and Lucien Kelly, Charlottetown; Cyril Mac-

The report is as follows:

We, the Grand Jury, have inspected the Queen's County Jail, Riverside Hospital, Hillsborough Hospital, The Provincial Infirmary and Beach Grove.

In viewing all these public institutions we did so very minutely, but before going thoroughly into our findings, if this report is to be shelved it might be better

B. C. Fir Tree Is Cut Down On Farm At Kinlock Road

A British Columbia fir tree, the seed of which was brought to the island by James Fletcher in 1830 was cut down recently and made four logs, at the farm of George MacDonald, son of Cyrus MacDonald, Kinlock Road.

According to Robert Snazell, director of the Cotton Memorial nursery B. C. firs are rare on the island. He stated that several of the trees are growing on the farm of B. B. Jones, Bunbury.

Mr. Snazell states that only certain kinds of B. C. fir will grow on the island. Only those which grow in the mountainous areas of B. C. survive here. The taller and perhaps the better known type which thrive near the coast will

not mature here.

The nursery director said he has had some requests to have B. C. fir trees started here in the nursery and intimated that some nursery stock may be brought her in the near future.



Honey Bun Coffee Cake

- In an 8-inch square cake pan, melt 3 tablespoons butter or margarine. Drizzle with 1/2 cup honey and sprinkle with 1/2 cup broken salted nuts.
