

Royals Cop Doubleheader; Jets, Virginians Spit Bill

ROCHESTER (AP)—Montreal Royals used strong pitching by veteran lefty Tommy Lasorda and rookie Ed Rakow to sweep an International League doubleheader from Rochester Red Wings Sunday 7-3 and 4-0.

Rakow gave up only two hits in blanking the Wings in the seven-inning nightcap. Loser was back Ricketts, knocked out in a three-run second inning featured by a two-run homer by the new Montreal first baseman, Jim McManus.

Sandy Amoros and Curt Roberts banged bases - empty home

runs as Lasorda went the route to win the regulation opener. Loser Bob Miller was kayoed in the fifth after surrendering five runs.

RICHMOND, Va. (AP)—Columbus Jets turned an unearned run and four-hit pitching by Al Jackson into a 1-0 second game win over Richmond Sunday after the Virginians had won the opener of the International League double-headed 3-2 with an unearned run in the ninth.

Lefty Bill Short restricted the Jets to three hits in the seven-inning second game.

Lefty Bob Wiesler turned in a five-hitter and helped bat the vees to their first game victory. After fourth inning solo homers by Joe McDaniel of the Jets and Deron Johnson of the Vees, Wiesler broke the 1-1 tie by singling home a run in the seventh.

HAVANA, Cuba (AP)—Right-hander Jack Fisher scored his fourth straight victory Sunday as he hurled Miami past Havana 3-1, to earn a split of an International League doubleheader.

The Cubs won the opener 4-1. The 20-year-old rookie pitcher scattered eight Havana hits. Starter and loser for Havana was Vicente Amor, his first loss of the year. He has won four games.

In the opener, Miami snapped a five-game Miami winning streak behind the six-hit pitching of Emilio Cueche. A pinch-hit homer by Mickey McDermott deprived Cueche of a shutout in his second victory.

BUFFALO N.Y. (AP)—Buffalo defeated Toronto 12-10 and 1-0 Sunday in an International League Doubleheader.

Pitcher Chris Short, making his debut with Buffalo in the second game, went the distance and held Toronto to three hits, Bobby Moran drove in the single run that turned the trick in the last inning.

In the opener, delayed nearly an hour and a half by rain, Frank Herrera provided the big hitting power for the Boscans. Herrera collected four hits, including two home runs, and drove in five runs.

Toronto had 16 hits with homers accounting for eight runs. Dave Pope grand-slammed in the third, Joe Altobelli connected with one in the sixth and Archie Wilson connected for a two-run homer in the ninth.

PGA Announces Fines To Players In Tourney

OKLAHOMA CITY (AP)—The professional Golfers Association announced Saturday that three players competing in the current Oklahoma City open golf tournament have been assessed fines for conduct detrimental to the game.

George Bayer, recognized as golf's longest hitter, was fined \$200 because he played two holes in a reckless fashion in an apparent attempt to run his score lighter.

He took a 10 on the par-three 4th hole in Friday's second round. He missed a short putt for bogey and then hit the ball back-ended six more times. He also took seven strokes on the 18th after being just off the green in two. This gave him an 80 for the round and a 36-hole total of 153.

Bayer took a score of 152 or better to qualify for the final 36 holes. Bayer left the course immediately and said he was going to Little Rock and Hot Springs, Ark. where he would compete next week.

Tony Leema, San Leandro, Calif., was fined \$100 for breaking a club on the 18th hole on the second round. Dan Langford, Enid, Okla., was fined \$100 for failure to complete the first round.

Berra's streak started in the second game of a doubleheader with Detroit at Yankee Stadium, July 28, 1957. He had 46 errorless games in 1957, 88 in 1958 and 14 this year. During that stretch he handled 970 chances.

Australian Jack Brabham Wins Monaco Grand Prix

MONTE CARLO (AP)—Jack Brabham of Australia, driving a Cooper, laid back until the favorites were knocked out and then sped to victory in the Grand Prix of Monaco auto race Sunday. It was the first race of the year which counts toward the world driving championship.

Tony Brooks of Britain, in an Italian Ferrari, crossed the finish line seconds behind Brabham to capture second place. Maurice Trintignant of France, in another Cooper, was third, two laps behind Brabham.

Britain's Stirling Moss had a commanding lead when a heart-breaking pit stop forced him out of the race after the 80th lap. His Cooper-Climax car was running smoothly and he had just set a lap record when he stopped to add some gasoline. The car didn't start well and then developed differential trouble and dropped out.

100-LAP RACE

The race is 100 laps around a winding 1.95-mile course laid out on the narrow streets of Monte Carlo. It twists around the gambling casino, down to the yacht basin and back to the casino along a short straightaway that mounts some 300 feet from sea level. The many sharp corners and lack of straight stretches limits speed.

It drew 16 starters, but only five finished. There were no injuries in the minor accidents.

Reds Blank Braves 3-0

Cincinnati whipped Milwaukee's Warren Spahn 3-0 Saturday and replaced Milwaukee at the top of the National League baseball race.

Bob Purkey, who beat Spahn twice previously this season, again was the culprit. He scattered seven hits for the shutout which robbed Spahn of his 250th pitching victory.

In the American League Chicago White Sox beat Cleveland 9-3 while Baltimore was taking a 4-3 decision from Boston Red Sox.

Also in the American League Saturday New York was shut out 7-0 by Washington's Hal Griggs on a two-hitter. The rejuvenated Detroit Tigers topped Kansas City 7-4.

Los Angeles won an 11-inning 6-5 victory over San Francisco in the National League. A single by Wally Moon scored Junior Gilliam with the decisive run.

Major Leagues Cut Teams To Reach 25-Player Limit

NEW YORK (AP)—The big deals failed to materialize and most of the major league baseball teams had to do some last-minute cutting to reach the 25-player limit by Saturday's midnight deadline.

Under baseball law, clubs must whittle their playing rosters to 25 men, plus any military personnel, a month after the start of the season.

New York Yankees, who had hoped to swing a trade for Washington's Camilo Pascual, instead sold pitcher Murry Dickson back to Kansas City and sent catcher Darrell Johnson and pitcher Zach Monroe to Richmond of the International League.

Optioned players may be recalled on a 24-hour basis. Those put on the disabled list must stay out 30 days.

The two Chicago clubs were the last to get under the wire. The Cubs, one over, were waiting the results of a possible trade before placing Dick Drott on the disabled list or optioning outfielder Chick King.

Here were other moves:

American League

Chicago: Released outfielder Don Mueller outright and sent pitcher Claude Raymond to Wichita in the American Association. First baseman Norm Cash is the 26th man on military status.

Boston: Optioned pitcher Herb Moford to Minneapolis of the American Association.

Kansas City: Optioned outfielder Zeke Bella to Shreveport of the Southern Association. John Tsitouris is a military returnee, giving the A's 26.

Baltimore: Optioned pitcher Wes Stock to Miami of the International League.

Cleveland: Optioned catcher Dick Brown to Buffalo of the International League.

Detroit: Reached 25 - player limit earlier.

National League

Pittsburgh: Placed pitcher George Witt on the disabled list (has R.C. Stevens from military, making 26 men.)

Philadelphia: Optioned pitcher

Christ Short to Buffalo of the International League.

Cincinnati: Optioned outfielder Bob Thurman to Omaha of the American Association.
