

News Summary.

The man Murray, charged with kidnapping Mitts, in St. John, N. B., was tried in that city a few days ago. The jury after an hour and a half's deliberation could not agree. They were then discharged and the defendant admitted to bail, himself in \$2000 and J. H. G. Campbell, Esq., Q. C., and Mr. George M. C. Howard in \$1000. The News considers the termination of the trial as most disgraceful. It was rumored that nine jurymen had agreed on a verdict of guilty but three whose names are mentioned refused to concur in it.

A brutal affair took place at Newcastle Delaware, a few days ago. Seven persons who were convicted of various offences were tied to a post and whipped. One of these was an aged man, of seventy years, who received twenty lashes upon his bare back. He cried bitterly during the whole ordeal. One man was placed in the pillory until he was totally benumbed with cold and then whipped with twenty lashes. Two boys of twelve years of age received the same punishment, and all this for comparatively petty offences. The Cape Ann Weekly Advertiser "blushes to record the fact."

The Ottawa Times says: "Mr. Mackenzie, a cool farmer of Hibbert, returning from St. Mary's last Saturday week, was waylaid by a man who jumped into his wagon and presented a pistol at his head. Mackenzie, eyeing the pistol with feigned curiosity, remarked: "hold it a little higher; I've got one like that at home." The blundering highwayman, thrown off his guard, did hold it a little higher, when Mackenzie gave him a powerful blow in the short ribs and drove off, leaving the rascal sprawling on the roadside."

Late advices from Hankow, China, state that the Revs. John Griffith and Mr. Miley of the London Wesleyan Mission, who left that city some time ago for an extended tour through the Chinese Empire, had safely returned. These gentlemen travelled through all the western Provinces of China to the confines of Tibet, a distance of over 3,000 miles. They were well treated by the natives everywhere. They saw an abundance of coal, and evidences of gold, silver, lead, and iron mines. The Catholic missions were very numerous throughout the country. Clergymen were found even in the small villages, and the converts to that faith were numbered by hundreds of thousands.

The following is said to be a list of General Grant's Cabinet and foreign ministers: Charles Francis Adams, of Massachusetts, Secretary of State. Hon. John Sherman, of Ohio, Secretary of the Treasury; James Hughes, of Indiana, Secretary of War; Admiral Porter, Secretary of the Navy; Horace Greely, of New York, Postmaster General; Hon. James Wilson, of Iowa, Attorney General; Edwin M. Stanton, of Pennsylvania, Minister to England; Hon. E. B. Washburne, of Illinois, Minister to France; Gen. John A. Rawlins, of Illinois, Minister to Spain; Hon. Benj. P. Wade, of Ohio, Minister to Russia; J. Lothrop Motley, of Massachusetts, Minister to Austria; George Bancroft, of New York, Minister to Prussia.

Since its sepeation, in 1842, the Free Church of Scotland has built 900 churches and raised \$40,000,000.

The population of the United States in 1869, it is estimated, will reach 38,000,000, or an increase of 868 per cent in 70 years.

From 1829 to 1830, 244,490 persons landed in America; from 1830 to 1840, 562,000 from 1840 to 1850, 1,587,300; and from 1850 to 1860, 2,077,624.

Nine Jews were nominated as candidates for Parliamentary honours in England. Seven succeeded in being returned—a larger number than ever before.

The Report of the Railway Commissioners on British Railways gives the average number of passengers travelling in and out of London daily at 300,000, 80,000 tons of goods per month pass through the London stations of the London and Birmingham line—a line only opened 30 years ago.

Twenty million pairs of shoes have been manufactured and sold at Lynn, Mass. in the past year.

In Bonavista, Newfoundland, some of the people are starving, on account of the fish-failure.

During the winter months, a steamer will leave St. John, N. B., every Thursday morning for Boston, and returning, leave Boston on Monday mornings.

The time of travel now between New York and San Francisco is 11 days. Only 360 miles is performed by a coach, all the rest being performed by rail.

The railroad between Moncton and Dorchester, N. B., was opened for traffic on the 9th. The first freight to pass over the Eastern Extension was five tons of poultry, consisting of turkeys, geese, and chickens, which is now waiting at Dorchester for transit. This lot is intended for the Boston market and will probably bring over \$5,000. This, says the Telegraph, is but the beginning of a new order of things for the farmers of Westmoreland, who will now be able to command a fair price for the products of their fertile county.

It is said that Mr. S. J. Scovill, the defaulting banker, was utterly ruined before he began his extensive gold operations. It appears that his losses on previous transactions varied from one thousand to thirty thousand dollars. He is reported to have lost six thousand dollars at one time by the robbery of his safe, and other large amounts by the failures of persons in business, with whom he was connected. In one case, he took a vessel in lieu of money for a debt of about thirty thousand dollars, which he entirely lost by the failure of the Columbia office, in which his vessel was insured. It is thought that he has not saved anything for himself from the wreck of his banking concern.
