LIVE LOBSTERS.—A new industry has been started in Charlottetown. Messrs. Rankin & White are about to export live lobsters, their headquarters being the Steam Navigation Company's wharf.

PINAFORE.—There are twenty-seven reserved seats in the dress circle, and twenty-five in the balcony. The plan of the dress circle is at Johnson's; the balcony plan is at Rankin's. Unreserved seat tickets may also be obtained at Johnson's.

FEDERAL NOTICE.—The funeral of the late Master Frederick L. McMillan will take place on Saturday morning at 10 o'clock at St. Danstan's Cathedral thence by train to Kensington, instead of on Friday morning as announced yesterday.

A CHURCH SEIZED.—On Monday last, a bailiff seized the Christian Workers' Church, on College street, Toronto, for local improvement taxes, and the church had to raise \$235 in short notice. The trustees thought the property exempt, but under a recent change in the provincial law, churches are liable for local improvements.

PROMPT PAYMENT.—Nineteen days after the late fire here, Mr. F. W. Hyndman, Charlottetown, handed Mr. J. A. Goulet a check for the amount of insurance held by him in the companies represented by Mr. Hyndman. We also have to thank Mr. Hyndman for being the first to pay us a policy on our recent loss. Such promptitude is very commendable.—Summerside Journal.

CHIEF ENGINEER.—A. H. Salter, Chief Engineer on board the steamship Orinoco, which visited Charlottetown last autumn with an excursion party, is under arrest at Bermuda charged with murder. It is alleged that he choked and kicked the passengers of the steamer's firemen, causing injuries which resulted in death. Salter is a native of Dartmouth, N. S., and has been on the Orinoco for about three years.

AN ISLANDER ENTERTAINED.—Mr. John Trainor, who leaves for Kingston, Kent Co., in a day or so to assume the management of the branch of the Merchants' Bank of Halifax at that place, was given an oyster supper at Maczow's restaurant last night by the C. M. B. A., of which society he is a valued member. About twenty-five or thirty of the members of the order were present, and a very enjoyable time was spent. After the banquet had been disposed of toasts were in order and the different speakers, while congratulating Mr. Trainor on his promotion, spoke of their regret for his departure from the city.—Moncton Times.

A SENSATION.—Yesterday afternoon between four and five o'clock there was quite a sensation in the vicinity of the Prince of Wales College, caused by a man of unusual mind parading the streets in a nude condition. The police were notified, and the man was arrested. The man is evidently from the country. He refused to talk and the police were not able to ascertain his name. A bottle of medicine was found in his pocket bearing a name which may or may not be that of the man arrested. He was arraigned before the Stipendiary Magistrate this forenoon, and remanded for eight days pending his identification or commitment to the Hospital for the Insane.

ODD FELLOWSHIP.—The Oddfellows of Charlottetown will celebrate their Natal Day tomorrow. The service in the afternoon will be held in St. James' church at three o'clock. Rev. T. F. Fullerton will deliver a sermon appropriate to the occasion, and Rev. G. M. Campbell will conduct the service. The brethren will meet at their hall at two o'clock, and march in procession from that place to the church. After the service in the church several of the principal characters in the opera will be introduced. The celebration will close with the presentation of the ever-popular opera, "Pinafore" at the Opera House in the evening. New scenery and costumes have been prepared, and the characters in the opera are in very good hands. There was a very successful rehearsal last evening, attended by about two hundred people. Those who wish to pass a pleasant evening should make a point of attending the performance to-morrow night.

THE NEW STEAMSHIP.—From the Quebec Morning Chronicle of the 23rd inst. we clip the following description of the new steamship "Campana" to be placed on the Lower Province route this summer in place of the SS Miramichi. "She is a Clyde build twin screw steamer of 1250 tons burden, has high-class passenger accommodations for 120 cabin passengers, has all modern conveniences, electric lights, bath rooms, etc. She is a schooner-rigged steamship 225 ft long 35 ft broad and 22 ft deep of hold. She is a good carrier and a splendid sea boat." Mr. G. W. Schurman, Summerside Agent for the Quebec Steam Navigation Co., tells us that he expects an increased trade both in passengers and freight during the coming season.

A procession will leave the lodge rooms at 1:30 p. m., marching to St. Mary's Episcopal Church, where a sermon will be preached by the Rev. J. M. Forbes, of Alberton. The evening's entertainment, consisting of an excellent programme, musical, literary and theatrical, followed by a social dance, which will take place in their rooms, will doubtless be enjoyed by all who attend.
