PROVINCIAL LEGISLATURE.
HOUSE OF ASSEMBLY.
OFFICIAL SUMMARY.

TUESDAY, April 24.
Mr. SPEAKER took the Chair at 11 a.m.
The Bill intituled "An Act relating to
Georgetown and Common" was read a
second time, committed to a Committee
of the Whole House, reported back from
Committee agreed to without amendment,
ordered to be engrossed, and read a third
time to-morrow.
Mr. FERGUSON submitted a Bill to pre-
vent the spread of the potato bug, which
was read a first and second time, committed
to a Committee of the Whole House, re-
ported back from Committee agreed to,
ordered to be engrossed and read a third
time to-morrow.
At 2 p. m., the House adjourned for one
hour.
After recess the SPEAKER took the Chair
at 3.45 p. m.
The House resolved itself into Committee
of the Whole to further consider the
Supply to Her Majesty, and after some
time spent therein, the Speaker resumed
the Chair, and the Chairman reported
twenty seven resolutions agreed to, which
were received by the House, and the ques-
tion of concurrence ordered to be put
thereon to-morrow.
Mr. J. R. McLEAN asked if the Govern-
ment intended to erect a post and rail
fence along the shore bank, west of
Knight's Wharf, Souris.
Mr. CAMPBELL replied that there had
been no petition asking for such a work,
but if necessary for the safety of the public,
it could be placed there.
Mr. GORDON submitted the report of the
Committee upon the Public Accounts, which
was read and ordered to be referred to a
Committee of the whole House to-morrow.
The Bill relating to the Acts of the
Dominion Parliament respecting
Insolvent Banks, Insurance Com-
panies, Loan Companies, Building Societies
and Trading Corporations was read a second
time, committed to a Committee of the
whole House, progress reported, and
leave granted to sit again. A message was
received from the Legislative Council to the
effect that they had passed the follow-
ing Bills: "An Act to enable the Trustees
of the Baptist Church, at Charlottetown,
to sell certain lands," "An Act to further
amend an Act to provide for the care and
maintenance of lunatics, idiots and persons
of unsound mind," "An Act to incorporate
the Freetown Hall Company."
Mr. PERCY asked for the detailed ac-
counts of the maintenance of the Hospital
for the Insane, for the year ended 31st
December, 1882, and the quarter ended
31st March last.
Mr. SULLIVAN said they would be sub-
mitted to the House, but it took some time
to prepare them.
Mr. J. R. McLEAN asked for an account
of the sums paid for printing, not let by
tender, during the years 1879, 1880, 1881
and 1882.
Mr. SULLIVAN said they would be
brought down as soon as possible,
Mr. BEER moved the following resolution:
Whereas, The provisions of the Canada
Temperance Act, 1878 have been declared to be
in force in this Province for some considerable
time, but through the want of Government
inspectors, whose duty it should be to see that
the provisions of said Act are carried out,
the act has been almost, if not altogether, a
failure.
Therefore Resolved, As the opinion of this
House, that the Dominion Government should
forthwith take the necessary steps to ensure
the carrying out of the provisions of said act.
It was of the opinion that while the Local
Government had nothing to do with the en-
forcement of the law, it was our duty to let
the Dominion Government know that it was
not being respected. We had been told that
the Fishery Award was dead. Steam Com-
munication had nearly died for want of
attention, and now the laws are not carried
into effect. There was more liquor sold now
than ever before.
Mr. BENTLEY while willing to do anything
to further the cause of Temperance, did not
consider Mr. Beer's resolution a step in that
direction. He considered the Local Govern-
ment should appoint the Inspectors and see
that the law is carried out. It is the law of
this Island, the people have accepted it by an
overwhelming majority. The Local Inspec-
tors should not have been dismissed, and if
Mr. Beer thought the Dominion Government
should appoint them, he should apply through
the Dominion representatives.
Mr. FARQUHARSON seconded the resolu-
tion. He said the Dominion Government
had made the law, and it was their duty
to carry it out. Were we not the better
for it? If the Local Government were to
direct their attention to it, we would have
something more done.
Mr. SINCLAIR said that in this Province
we found that the law of the Land was not
being carried out as it should be. In-
spectors had been dismissed, and now it
was left to the public at large. The
Dominion Government had done all that
they would do, and the Provincial Govern-
ment should appoint Inspectors to see that
the law was respected. It was their duty
to search out and prosecute the cases.
Liquor was the curse of the country, and
he wished that it was abolished from the
Land. He moved, seconded by Mr. Hooper
that the word "Dominion" be struck out of
the resolution, and the word "Provincial"
inserted.
Mr. J. R. McLEAN said that the Canada
Temperance Act was too stringent in its
provisions; the old License Law had been a
good one, and did much to suppress the
traffic, and was, generally, of far more
benefit.
Mr. FERGUSON saw no use in this House
considering the resolution for we had nothing
to do with it. What right had we to
censure the Dominion Government? It
was their duty to provide means to carry
out the law. We might just as well pass a
resolution calling attention to the very de-
fective way in which the law providing for
the purity of elections was administered, or
censuring a Judge for palliating a breach of
the law, because it was the custom of the
country. It was no part of the duty of the
Provincial Government to carry out Do-
minion laws. The Local Government had
yielded to the wishes of certain parties and
appointed Inspectors, but the experience of
their operations proved that their efforts
were comparatively fruitless. Outside of
Summerside they received no support from
the public opinion. It is the duty of the Do-
minion Government to enforce their own
laws. They have their province and we
have ours.
Mr. CAMPBELL said this Legislature had
no right to pass censure on the Dominion
Government. We have no right to take the
people's money to pay men to carry out the
Dominion law—they get the fines. He be-
lieved the Act to be unworkable. He just-
ified the resolution to permit the importa-
tion of any quantity of liquor and then
forbid the selling of it.
Mr. Yeo did not understand the resolu-
tion as conveying a censure on either the
Dominion or Local Governments. The act
was not giving satisfaction, and the Local
Government should have drawn the atten-
tion of the Dominion Government to it.
The sooner the Act was replaced by one
more workable the better.
Mr. BENTLEY would not support Mr.
Beer's resolution, as he believed it would
have an injurious effect, but was inclined
to vote for the amendment, believing it to be
the duty of the Provincial Government to
appoint Inspectors. What was a good or
proper License Law? We must be guided
in our judgment by the old one which
we had—which no friend of temperance
could approve of. There was no such a
thing as good liquor, and no man was the
better for it. He believed the efforts of
the Inspectors had been successful as also
had the Act, for the results had proved it,
as might be seen by reference to the
Customs Returns. There had been a saving
in 1880 of \$60,000 of duties to the people
as the result of the Act. This would
justify the continuance of the Inspectors.
No fault had ever been found with their
appointment, and there were no petitions
asking for their dismissal.
Mr. GILLIS considered that it was not
the province of this Legislature to see that
the Dominion Laws were carried into effect.
The Canada Temperance Act was not
suitable for this country. We must pro-
mote temperance by moral suasion, it is
impracticable by legislation. It would have
been better for this country if the Act had
never been passed, for it had demoralized
the people greatly. Mr. Bentley's figures
were not strictly correct. A large amount
of liquor was imported from the other Pro-
vinces, which did not appear on our
Customs Returns. There was quite as
much drinking now as before, and there
were more places where it could be ob-
tained. The Inspectors should never have
been appointed.
Mr. HOLLAND said the General Govern-
ment should carry out their own laws, but
if the fines went into the Provincial Treas-
ury, then it might be our duty to do so.
He believed that if the present Govern-
ment found it to be their duty to appoint
Inspectors, they would do so.

The Bradford Cemetery Company have
just completed, on behalf of the tenantry
of the Duke of Devonshire on the Bolton
Abbey estates, a memorial cross to the late
Lord Frederick Cavendish. The cross,
which is carved from the fine white free-
stone obtained at Bolton-Wood quarries, is
a close copy both in design and ornamenta-
tion of the ancient Runic remains found
in different parts of the country. It con-
sists of five pieces, namely, a base about
seven feet square and two feet thick, formed
of one solid block; a pedestal about four
feet six inches high by four feet square;
an ornamental shaft, the cross proper, and
a cap or finial. The cross and shaft are
very richly carved with the curious inter-
lacing patterns peculiar to Runic remains.
On the pedestal is the following inscription
in Runic type:—
To the Beloved Memory of
Lord Frederick Charles Cavendish,
Son of William, 7th Duke of Devonshire,
and of Bismarck Georgina, his wife,
Born November 30th, 1836.
He went out as Chief Secretary to Ireland
"Full of love to that country,
"Full of hope for its future,
"Full of capacity to render her service."
And was murdered in the Phoenix Park Dublin,
Within twelve hours of his arrival,
May 6th, 1882.
"The Lord grant the earth her desire,
And fulfil all thy mind."
The text of the inscription was dictated
upon by Lady F. Cavendish and Lady Eg-
gerton, his sister, while the lines quoted are
words used by Mr. Gladstone in a communi-
cating the news of the assassination to the
House of Commons. The cross is to be
erected at the edge of the Abbey burial
ground, in a romantic spot, beneath the
shade of one of the magnificent sycamore
trees for which the Abbey is famous.
The danger of overtraining has been fre-

of Sullivan, the pugilist, is another illustra-

smiling laid this admired specimen of
physical development at the point of death, and
renders it a question whether he will be able
to fill his sporting engagements. It is a
strange fact that consumption is the Nemesis
of the pugilist. His bodily vigour, stal-
wart frame, and endurance are no defence
against the insidious approaches of pulmon-
ary diseases. Not far down the journey
which the fistich champion travels there ad-
vances a foe, deadly in his attack, who
takes no account of the Marquis of Queens-
berry's rules.
