SAM SMITH.—Rev. Sam W. Smith lectured in Brunswick street Methodist church last evening; to-night he speaks in Amherst and to-morrow night at Moncton. It is yet undecided if he will visit this city the present trip or not.

A PROLIFIC SEED.—The Moncton Transcript says: Hiram H. Graves, of Petticoats, about four years ago, when the Northwest car was around, obtained a single seed of black barley, which he planted on the Morton farm. This season he has ten bushels grown from that single seed for sale.

MORE POLICE TROUBLES.—A St. J. dea. patch of the 19th says: At 10:15 to-night Chief of Police Clark dismissed officer William Weatherhead. The latter was associated with officer Burchell in the late pejury case against Capt. A. H. Rawling. He says he asked to know the cause of dismissal, but got no satisfaction. He has retained Dr. Silas Alward, and will report for duty this morning and advise. The end of the police trouble seems not yet by any means.

SENT ACT.—At the Police Court this morning, Patrick Curley was sentenced to two months imprisonment for a third offence—the selling of a half glass of gin. Five other cases were adjourned.

At Victoria, yesterday, before Henry Wadman and Donald W. Fa'ar, J. P.'s, Ann Faroo, of that place, was convicted of a violation of the C. T. Act, and fined \$50 or two months imprisonment. At the same place, on the same day, before Henry Wadman and John J. Coughlan, J. P.'s, Patrick Tranor, Kelly's Cross, was also convicted and fined \$50 or two months. Both convictions were for sale of hop beer, which the witnesses swore had an intoxicating effect.

SUNKEN SCHOONER.—A correspondent at Georgetown writes: Capt. Dicks, of the schooner Hattie, from Sydney, reports that on Friday last, at the entrance of Big Bras D'Or Lake, he saw a sunken schooner about half a mile east of the light, in about nine fathoms of water, her sails all set, masts about four feet under water, main gaff showing, and appeared to be a vessel of 25 to 40 tons. The gaff had been sprung and repaired with a piece of galvanized hoop iron, and had a lignum vitae fan leader on the boom for reefing. She is a dangerous obstruction to navigation, and her loss has not before been reported. Nothing was known of the fate of the crew.

MY OWN CANADIAN HOME.—The Montreal Gazette says: The national song, My Own Canadian Home, is being sung by more children, perhaps, than any other song in the Dominion. This is due to the generosity of the St. Croix Soap Company, of St. Stephen, N. B. J. P. Ganong, representing that Company, recently presented to every scholar in the public schools in the principal schools of New Brunswick a copy of the song, and now he has presented a copy to each teacher in Nova Scotia, P. E. Island and Ontario, in all over 20,000, at a value of ten cents each. Notwithstanding that it is, in some respects, an advertisement, still it is a very generous act.

SHIPMENTS FROM SUMMERSIDE.—The Pioneer says: On Monday morning two horses were shipped by R. C. McLeod for Boston by the St. Lawrence. On Tuesday, Mr. L. A. Arsenault, of Wellington, took away three horses for St. Mary's Bay, N. S., with which part of the mainland he is endeavouring to work up a trade. On the same morning Mr. John Forbes, of Tyne Valley, sent over to Sussex 45 lambs. On Wednesday morning, Mr. J. Henry shipped for the United States market 210 sheep and lambs, and five horses were also taken away by the same boat. Three of these were shipped by Mr. Benj. Besipito for a gentleman in Boston, and were worth between \$500 and \$800. These horses were Mr. Richards' Herando mare, Juno; Jas. Johnston's Island Chief, and David Rogers' Harry.

The performance of "Leah the Forsaken" was capital. The Financial Situation.

CONFIDENCE RETURNING.

Another Bank Failure.

MONTREAL, Nov. 20.

Duncan McIntyre, who has arrived in London, cabled this morning that the worst is over and that better prices may be looked for.

The market, so far as Pacifics are concerned, appears to have been favorably influenced by his presence, as the advanced four points to-day, closing at 7 3/4. Things are better here to-day.

LONDON, Nov. 20.

The panic in the Stock Exchange has subsided, and throughout the day there was a steady growth of confidence. The stock market is better all round. It is believed the worst is over.

PHILADELPHIA, Nov. 20.

The failure of Barker, Bros. & Co., bankers and brokers, is announced on the Stock Exchange.

Parnell's Case.

DUBLIN, Nov. 20.

United Ireland says: "Ireland's character for morality will intensify the scorn of people for those caning hypocrites who think publicity is the essence of sin. Now is the time to rebuke Parnell for public services. In reply to all affected priests and Pharisees we say: 'We have our leader and mean to keep him.'"

The Irish Catholic says: "Parnell sinned as much against Ireland as he did against morality, but grave political expediency demands that he continue to be the leader of his party."

The Labor World, Michael Davitt's paper, says: "The crisis in the Home Rule movement caused by Parnell's conviction demands that he efface himself from public life for the brief period which must ensue before he can legally marry Mrs. O'Shea."

DUBLIN, Nov. 20.

At a meeting to be held to-night in this city the Lord Mayor will preside. Justin McCarthy will propose and Timothy Healy will second a resolution of confidence in Parnell's leadership.

Ottawa Notes.

OTTAWA, Ont., Nov. 20.

The Executive have refused to interfere in the case of T. A. Monteau, who murdered his brother-in-law at Sherbrook.

Hon. Mr. Dawdney is expected here from England to-morrow.

Sir Hector Langevin positively denies any knowledge of the Tate-McGreevy transactions. He says his name is being used every day as making promises of which he never heard, and no doubt his name was used in a similar manner in the McGreevy matter.

Trouble in the Congo.

LONDON, Nov. 20.

Despatches from the Congo State say the Baptist Missions steamboat Peace, stationed on the Upper Congo River, has been confiscated by officers of the Congo State, on the ground that it was required for state purposes on the Kassia River. The British flag was hauled down and the flag of the Congo State hoisted on the vessel. The engineers and stokers were compelled to continue their services.

Liquor License in Halifax.

HALIFAX, Nov. 20.

The Liquor Dealers' Association will meet to-morrow evening to come to a decision whether they will assist the temperance people in the effort to remove from office License Inspector McKasey, on condition of pending prosecution by the Law and Order League being withdrawn.

Another Steamer.

HALIFAX, Nov. 20.

It is understood that J. E. Chipman, at present in England, has about concluded negotiations for another steamer for the Canada-Atlantic Line, to run between here and Boston alternately with the Halifax. The steamer is about six years old, and was used by the Russian government during the war with Chili.

McGill University.

MONTREAL, Nov. 20.

The McGill University banquet which took place at the Windsor to-night, was a brilliant affair. Sir Donald Smith presided. Amongst those present were Sir John and Lady Macdonald, Sir John and Lady Thompson, Hon. Alfred and Madame Laurier. The two Leaders delivered magnificent addresses.

Unrestricted Transit

LONDON, Nov. 20.

The Official Journal to-day publishes a decree allowing unrestricted transit of goods between the Boers and British South Africa, subject to an ad valorem duty of three per cent; also a decree providing for free navigation of the Scambria and Chise-cable rivers by all nations.

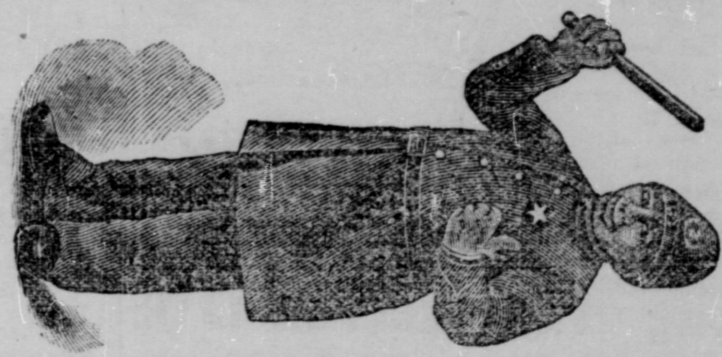
