WASHINGTON (AP)—President
Kennedy, speaking to the
country in a spirit of cautious
hope, said Friday night the

of Moscow "is a victory for man-
kind."
He added that:
"This treaty is not the mil-
lennium. It will not resolve all
conflicts, or cause the Commu-
nists to forego their ambitions,
or eliminate the dangers of
war."
"It will not reduce our needs
for arms or allies, or programs
of assistance to others."
"But it is an important first
step—a step toward peace, a
step toward disarmament—
away from war."
The chief executive spoke via
radio and television at a time
when the Senate is rumbling
with an awareness that Rus-
sia, in the past, has broken
treaties and with the misgivings
that recall Senate rejection of
the League of Nations a genera-
tion ago.

ago.
He gave no details in reply-
ing to a Commons question
other than saying that so later
forecast has been done.
"Last year, unemployment be-
gan to mount between Septem-
ber and October and hit a mid-
winter peak last March of 5.69,
000 estimated jobs or 8.4 per-
cent of the labor force."
The record in post-war years
was set in February, 1961, when
719,000 workers were idle.

with both schemes.
He said he has no doubt that
Ontario has jurisdiction over
pensions and "it should be up to
how it exercises it."
Stanfield also called for a
widening of the list of pro-
jects covered by the proposed
municipal loans.
Premier Louis Robichaud of
New Brunswick said he wants
schools and hospitals included
in the federal loans plan. Ot-
tawa should also pay half the
municipal interest on the loans,
he said.

Former Chief Is Acquitted

QUEBEC (CP)—Quebec Court
of Appeal Friday unanimously
acquitted Rosario Lemire, 74,
former liquor police chief here
who has been found guilty of
frauding the provincial govern-
ment of about \$8,500 through
fictitious expense accounts.
Lemire last September had
been sentenced to three months
in jail after he was found guilty
at his trial.
The appeal was heard by
Chief Justice Lucien Tremblay
and Justices Paul C. Casey and
André Taschereau.
Chief Justice Tremblay said
the crown's evidence did not
show beyond a shadow of doubt
that Lemire had falsified the
accounts were in fact not made
by him.
He said Lemire had been able
to identify the expense accounts
showing justified expenses, but
that he could not recall details
of the other accounts.
The crown alleged the fraud
took place between Jan. 1, 1962,
and April 1, 1960.
Mr. Justice Casey recalled
that Lemire had received in-
structions from the chief ally-
general to submit monthly
expense accounts instead of
receiving a pay increase.
