Farm Wages U. S. Steel Report

OTTAWA, March 4 - (CP) - Farm wages in Canada in mid-January were higher than a year ago, the Bureau of Statistics reported Saturday.

The average farmhand receiving daily rates with board found those rates at \$4.06 in January compared with \$3.63 a year before, while daily rates without board were \$5.11 compared with \$4.52.

Monthly wages with board advanced to \$75.76 from \$69.04, and without board to \$110.08 from \$98.55.

CLEVELAND, March 4 - (AP) - American steel mills, seeking to jump their production rate, are facing a shortage of raw materials, Steel magazine says today.

The metal-working journal says that "pig iron and coke for the foundries are increasingly scarce" and that a "serious shortage of scrap" is threatened.

The shortage of scrap has some mills "operating on hand-to-mouth inventories," the magazine adds. Talk is heard in the market of possible early resort to mandatory allocation of scrap.

The mills operated at 100 per cent of rated capacity last week and rolled out almost 2,000,000 tons of ingots but are still feeling the effects of the railroad strike, the magazine says. That was a percentage jump of half a point.

The week before the strike they had turned out a record of 2,025,000 tons.

Finish steel prices, which were frozen in January, held fast week. The magazine's weighted index held at 171.92 and the arithmetical composite at 166.62.

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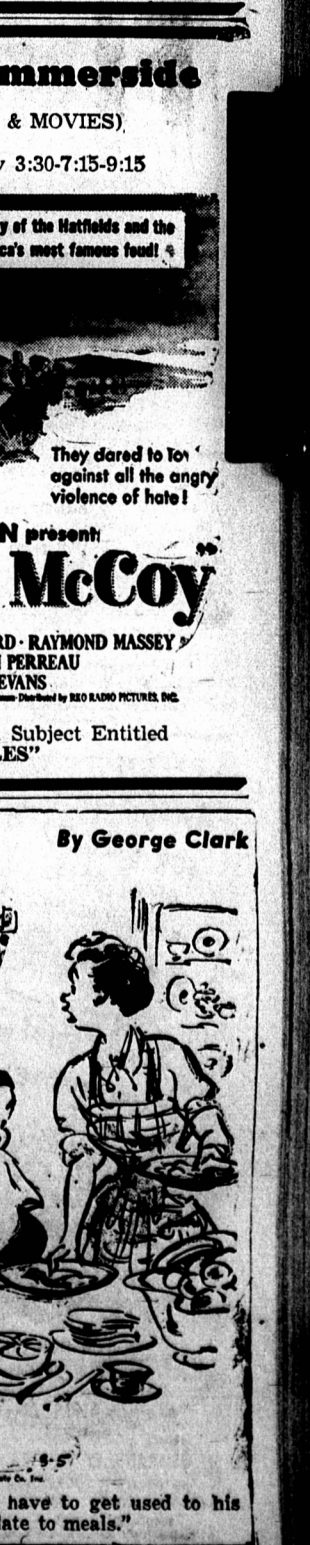
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"His superior officers will just have to get used to his dawdling and being late to meals."
