Annual Meeting Of L. P. U. Union

Mr. Leonard T. Rush was re-elected president of the Labour-Protective Union for his fifth term at the annual meeting held in the L.P.U. Hall yesterday. He noted in his annual report that due to work to be done on the warves at Summerside and during this summer the coming season should be one of the best for local longshoremen. It would mean that freighters will be coming to this port for loading where normally they would load at other ports.

Mr. Rush also told the largely attended meeting that during the past term 30 new members were admitted to the Union and 25 former members were re-admitted. At the same time the credit report showed the Union to be in a strong financial condition as a result of a good year. New rules regarding conduct of Union members loading or unloading cargoes here will go into effect immediately. It was decided a decision was reached to have the Queen's County representatives in the Federal Parliament invited to visit the Railway Wharf to see conditions under which Union members are working.

To Make Basic Geological Survey

A comprehensive geological survey which will take approximately three years to complete is being started this week by Dr. V. K. Prater, of the Geological Surveys of Canada, who arrived from Ottawa recently to begin the work. A request for such a survey was made in the Provincial Legislature last year by Hon. Walter E. Darby, Provincial Treasurer and Attorney General, and his suggestion was followed up by Hon. Eugene Cullen, Minister of Industry and Natural Resources. The survey envisions a long-range program to map the rock strata and glacial deposits to permit a better knowledge of the geological structure of the island. Mr. Prater said that he would be here for three months this year while engaged in the work. Asked about possible discoveries in this Province he stated that the survey was not arranged for that purpose although the possibility of the presence of minerals would be noted by study of the structural forms. Much of the work will be done along the coast line.
