

# Will Seek Parking Space On Federal Building Site

The possibility of securing parking space for approximately 70 cars in the block on Queen Street immediately in the rear of the Riley Building is being taken up with Ottawa, according to a report made by Mr. John F. Connolly to the Charlottetown Community Planning Association at their regular meeting last night in City Hall.

Mr. Connolly, who with Chief of Police MacArthur, Chief H. Jewell of the Fire Department and Fire Marshall T. Arthur Campbell, stated that he had approached Premier Jones on the matter and had been encouraged to write the federal authorities at Ottawa, with the approval of the Premier, to have the site made available for parking.

A number of abandoned sheds and barns would have to be removed, which, however, are only regarded as minor obstacles to the project.

A study of traffic loads at various busy intersections, and the possible advantages of one-way streets is being continued, but no decision can be reached on these matters until the trend of summer traffic is determined.

# Cites Growing Requirements In Rural Electrification

The steady growth in the number of users of electricity, especially in rural areas, in recent years was highlighted by Hon. A. W. Matheson, Minister of Health and Welfare, when he rose to resume his part in the Draft Address debate in the Legislature yesterday.

Hon. Mr. Matheson pointed out that while city users had increased approximately 1,500 in number

in a thirteen year period, rural users had jumped from 861 to 4,844. He estimated there were about 7,000 homes needing electricity where there would be only two families to the mile and another 5,000 with a population density of four to the mile.

The Minister said that rural electrification is a very important question to the people, the Government, the Public Utilities Commission and the Maritime Electric Company. While he believed electricity had to be provided he foresaw that it would cost a lot of money. He was inclined to agree with other speakers who believed that private enterprise would be the source of power. However, he expressed the opinion that of the many schemes advanced any selected should be carefully studied.

fully and so earnestly.

"For seven years you worked among the Parishioners of the Basilica parish and then returned to your studies. This time it was the Apollinaris in Rome where, after two years of study, you received a Licentiate in Canon Law in 1934.

"After returning from Rome you went back to the Basilica parish and in 1942 you were appointed Parish Priest at Cavignan. In 1946 you once more returned to Charlottetown. On your departure from Cavignan the sincere regret expressed by the parishioners indicated how much you had become endeared to them during your four-year tenure as their Parish Priest.

"First as Curate, then as Secretary to Bishop Louis J. O'Leary, later as Chancellor and finally, in your present capacity as Rector of the Basilica, you have given over twenty years of unstinted labor to your native parish and the diocese.

"During this period much of your time and energy have been contributed to church societies which are so essential to parish life. You also found time to be associated with public and philanthropic organizations for the betterment of our city and province. Your concern for the poor and the unfortunate and your support of the work of the Catholic Social Welfare Bureau has merited the approval of all classes and creeds.

But it is for your interest in the youth of the city, especially in the pupils of Queen Square School, so well exemplified by your annual retreat for the graduating class, that calls forth our greatest approbation. You have always evinced a keen interest in sports and your prowess as a bowler is well known especially to opposing teams.

"We cannot help but recall the good parents who by their example and encouragement so well directed your youthful thoughts and aspirations toward the Holy Priesthood. They too, we feel sure are looking down from Heaven with loving eyes on a son who has so fully reached the pinnacle of their fondest hopes.

"Your fellow Knights extend to you our heartfelt congratulations and pray that you will long be spared to continue your labors in the Master's Vineyard.

There has been no indication that the council, where Britain, France, Nationalist China, Russia and the U. S. have the veto, has been able to agree on a successor to Lie.

## Burst of Applause

Lie was greeted with a burst of applause when he finished. Foreign Secretary Anthony Eden of Britain and the U. S. chief delegate, Henry Cabot Lodge, Jr., rushed forward to shake his hand.

Lie's 7,400-word speech is expected to touch off one of the hottest debates in UN history.

The secretary-general charged that Russia and four satellite members interfered with him. The satellites are Byelo-Russia, the Ukraine, Poland and Czechoslovakia.

"Because of the stand I took in support of United Nations action against armed aggression in Korea," he asserted, "these five member governments have refused since 1950 even to recognize me as
