

**Local and Other Items.**

THE Chinese are leaving the Provinces in consequence of the imposition of the head tax.

A CONTEMPORARY says: A deficit of votes, following two or three deficits in the Treasury, has made an end of Mr. Cartwright.

THE regular monthly meeting of "Sir John A." Hook & Ladder Co. will be held in their rooms on Monday evening next, at 7 o'clock. A full attendance of members is requested.

DURING the past season 205,931 pieces of square and flatted timber passed through the Chandiere slides, and 304,796 saw logs and 6,000 pieces of timber through the Gattineau boom.

At the Stipendiary Magistrate's Court, this forenoon, James Troy was fined \$1 and costs for 4 days for being drunk and incapable; Neil Livingstone was fined \$1 and costs for assaulting Donald Bell, truckman.

THE schooner *Fleetwing*, owned by Hon. George W. Howlan, arrived at Alberton from Labrador on the 27th inst., with seven hundred barrels of herring. The *Fleetwing* reports herring scarce on Labrador when she left.

THE application by Mr. DeVeber for a recount of the votes taken at the election in St. John City was dismissed by Judge Wattors, on the 26th inst. The election of Hon. S. L. Tilley as the representative of the City of St. John in the Parliament of Canada is therefore confirmed.

ADMIRAL INGLEDEN entertained a large number of ladies and gentlemen of this city by a "bonnet-hop" on board the *Belle-rophon* yesterday. The ships left for Quebec this morning, where they will remain till the arrival of the Marquis of Lorne. They will then return to Halifax, and afterwards to winter quarters in the West Indies.

THERE was a long and somewhat bitter feeling in the discussion in the Montreal City Council on Monday, upon the question of paying the volunteers for their services on the 12th of July. The bill sent in by Col. Fletcher was for \$7,855.37, and was thrown out on motion by 12 yeas to 9 nays. All the French and Irish Catholics opposed the payment of the account, while the English members favored it. It is quite certain that the volunteers will have to look elsewhere than to the Montreal City Council for their pay. The troops were called out by six magistrates in opposition to the will of the Mayor and a full meeting of the magistrates of the district.

A MATCH race for a purse of \$200 between Mr. Finlay McNeill's horse "French Sporter," of Summerside, and Mr. J. Ramsay's grey mare "Pendleton's Panacea," of St. John, took place at Moosepath race course, St. John, on the 25th inst. The following is the result:—

**Another Dead Man Found.**

WAS HE MURDERED OR KILLED BY THE TRAIN?

FREDERICTON, Sept. 26.

A man named Edward Sweeney, unmarried, a resident near Enniskillen, Queen's County, was found dead on the Railway track, this morning, east of Gaspereaux. The body was first reported by the freight train, which saw the man, but could not stop. When examined by the people on the next train, a two hours' interval, he was still and cold.

Mr. McLeod went out with the passenger train this morning, and had the body placed in Enniskillen Station. The place where he was found was examined by Mr. McLeod, Col. Mamsell, Robert Robinson, William Elder and others. There was no blood at the place. The man was lying on his face parallel with the rails, in the centre of the track. The back of his head was scratched, his clothes torn, and a bruise on his forehead. He must either have been lying on the track and been run over, or killed previously and placed on the track. His limbs were untouched.

There was an entertainment at Akerley's, in Clarendon, the previous night, and Sweeney may have been there. There is a public house near the place. The matter requires investigation. The body was not dragged by the train, but some pieces of his clothing were carried to a considerable distance.—*St. John Telegraph.*

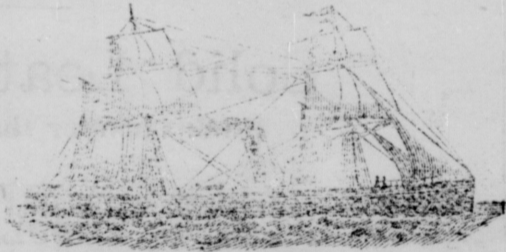
