By DALY WARRINGTON (CP)—Two close-finish byelections Tuesday left party strength unchanged in the 63-seat Nova Scotia legislature. The Liberal opposition retained an inversed seat by a small margin. Majorities were almost identical. In Hants East, J. Albert Ethington, 43, came from behind to defeat Liberal Gerald A. Regan, 64, by 77 votes. In Inverness Liberal William N. Maclean, 54, nosed out Conservative Allan Davis, 43, by 69 votes.

NEW YORK (AP)—The producer of My Fair Lady, the all-time Broadway musical comedy, said it will definitely close Sept. 29 after 2,717 performances on Broadway. The show, which opened in 1957, is the longest-running musical in Broadway history.

Refugee Safe In Bullet Hail

BERLIN (AP)—A 23-year-old man swam 300 yards to the safety of West Berlin Tuesday despite tommy-gun fire from East German police. The dramatic escape—first of the day—occurred at 8:30 a.m. near the old Reichstag building. Jumping from the Marshell bridge in East Berlin, the young man swam along the east bank of the Spree River, apparently escaping detection until he was ready to swim across. Four shots were fired at him, West Berlin police said, but all missed.

Local Couple In Hospital After Crash

LONDON, Ont. (CP)—A Prince Edward Island couple were injured Tuesday when their car was crushed in another vehicle on the outskirts of London. The hospital are Mr. and Mrs. Nemir Twell of Charlottetown, P.E.I. Mr. Twell, 73, driver of the car, suffered a cut arm and leg. His wife, Saïda, suffered face and knee injuries.
