Provincial Amateur Golf Champion



Although Labor Day, September 4th, is still a full four weeks away, the Department of Physical Fitness in co-operation with the Charlottetown Abegweit Amateur Athletic Association are already laying their plans for the holding of the Maritime Track and Field Championships to be held here over Memorial Day on that date. Entry forms, regulations and information concerning the meet have been sent out to all the leading amateur clubs and associations throughout the Maritimes, who are expected to be represented at the big annual event.

As in previous years, the meet will be under the sanction of the Maritime Amateur Athletic Union and is to be run by Amateur Athletic Union of Canada rules, and therefore all athletes competing must be in good amateur standing and must produce their 1950 amateur cards on making application for entry in the meet.

For the information of those who may not be familiar with the procedure of entry, here are some of the rules and regulations to be followed. Clubs and associations are allowed up to three entries in each event, with a single contestant entering as many events as he wishes. Each club or association will be entitled to enter a relay team of four in the mile relay event. Regardless of these rules, however, the events will be run off as per the program set up, and there will be no delaying of events to accommodate the entry of competitors. All entries will be addressed to Brigadier W. W. Reid, Director of Physical Fitness, P.O. Box 70, Charlottetown, P.E.I. The closing entry date will be midnight Aug. 31st.

Officials also wish to draw to the attention of contesting clubs or independent athletes, that there will be no junior events in connection with the Meet. Arrangements are also being made by the sponsoring bodies in co-operation with the Charlottetown Labor Union, to have the latter organization stage a few special events in connection with the meet, to commemorate Labor Day. It is hoped that this special feature may assist in giving athletes competing in several events an opportunity to rest between the various competitions.

In addition to the MacNair Trophy, emblematic of the Maritime Senior Track and Field championship and held annually by the team compiling the highest aggregate point standing, many other awards will be put up to be competed for. Included in these awards will be the official gold, silver and bronze M. A. A. U. medals for the first, second and third place winners in each event respectively, which will all be suitably engraved for the occasion. The best all-around athlete will also receive the Samuel F. Doyle Memorial Trophy to be held for one year and also a special award to be held permanently.

Special entertainments in connection with the meet, will include a dinner to be held at Sandy's Restaurant, Marshfield on the evening of the day of the meet, to be followed by a dance at the Charlottetown Armouries later the same evening, when His Honor Lt.-Gov. J. A. Bernard will make the official presentation of prizes. All competitors, officials, as well as members of local ball and other teams, will be guests of the Department of Physical Fitness at these functions.

But the biggest feature of the annual event, will be the competitions themselves. With such leading track and field teams in Maritimes circles as the Antigonish Highland Society, present holders of the MacNair Trophy, Halifax Wanderers A. A. C., Halifax Navy (H. M. C. S. Strathcona), Moncton, Fredericton etc. competing against this Province's crack representatives the Abbies, local sporting enthusiasts will have the opportunity of witnessing the cream of Maritime athletes in action.

In junior men's singles competition B. Connolly, B. Rush, William Ledwell and A. Hughes also advanced into the second round.

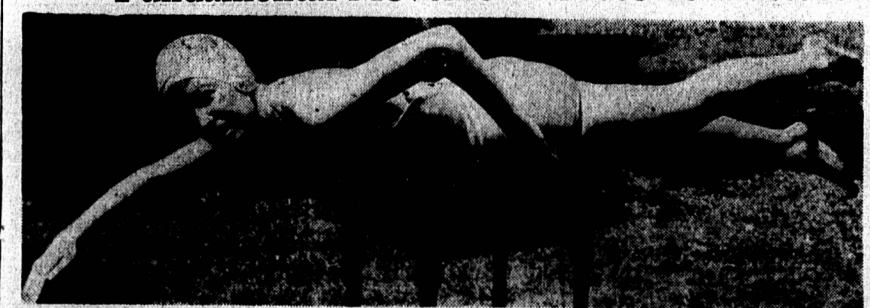

For Speed and Efficiency in the Water Fundamental Movements Must Be Mastered



The Red Cross Swimming Instructors, Joan Wood, demonstrates the sideward turn of the head for the "gasp" portion of the breathing cycle. Note that the hips and shoulders remain in line. This is made possible by the cupping of the water as it flows past the face thus permitting the intake of air without rolling the body. The kick pivots from the thigh with the feet in a pigeon toed position. The ankles and knees are relaxed giving the driving force to the water with the minimum of effort.

The Flutter Kick

The flutter kick with the legs is an important part of the crawl. The main purpose of this flutter kick is to place the body in a planing position because without this powerful kick your hips sink and there is a drag produced. 80% of your forward drive is produced by the arms but the legs, contributing the 20%, make the work of the arms much easier. The legs should beat evenly-unsupported.

and down about a foot apart, with an equal amount of strength being used on each downward drive. Hold your legs practically straight, keep them loose. Your toes should be pointed inward slightly as this kick and pull position will aid in avoiding tension. Above all, do not permit your knees or ankles to be taut. Too many swimmers hold their legs and feet in one stiff line from hip to toe. It takes a lot of practise to really get on to the proper relaxation of your ankles. When you kick, your foot should not break the surface of the water. Good advice is to develop the kick to the point where you can forget it.

Breathing

Breathing while swimming the crawl stroke does not come naturally to most people since exhaling beneath the surface of the water requires more than to exhale into ordinary atmosphere. However, breathing can be readily learned once one realizes that an effort is

(1) Inhale through your mouth upon each complete cycle of the arm. Most people breathe on the right hand side by turning their heads in that direction. However, some of you will find left-hand-side breathing easier. The choice is yours. Don't hold your breath. Your exhales should be slow—four or five times longer than your inhales keep a flow of air going in and out continuously. The inhaling which takes place as one arm is proceeding with its recovery should be done through the mouth in a gasping action, while the head is turned and the mouth cupped.

(2) After this instantaneous gasp for air at one side the head is returned to the forward position and the exhaling begins by blowing the air out through the nose and mouth using the diaphragm muscles together with the squeezing of the stomach muscles. All the air should be expelled with the squeezing of the stomach muscles. All the air should be expelled before the head is again turned at the next cycle.
