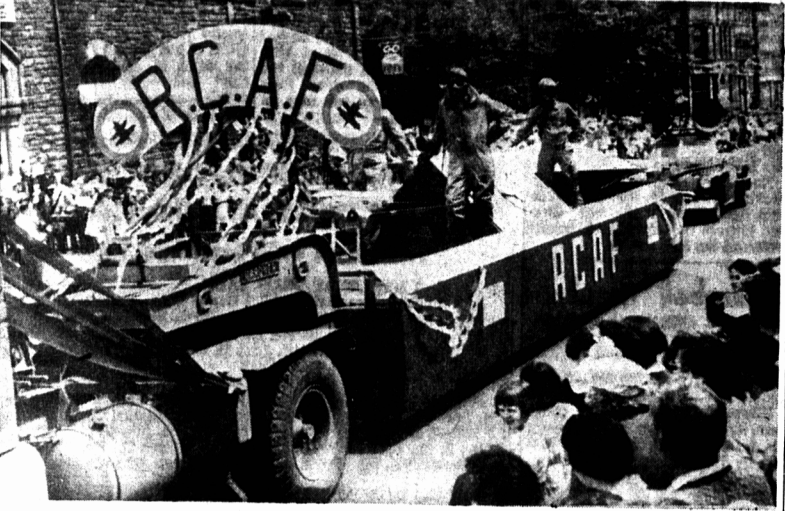

EMPLOYMENT RECORD WASHINGTON (AP) - Employment in the United States boomed in July to an all-time record of nearly 65,000,000, while the number of jobs dipped below 2,500,000, the government reported Tuesday. The fifth successive monthly rise in employment carried the total of jobholders to 64,995,000. The total is 3,000,000 above July a year ago. Temporary Bridge To Be Torn Down The temporary bridge, built at the time when the new bridge was being constructed at Montague, is being torn down this week. The contract for the work has been let to Mr. Joseph Vuozzo of Montague. The bridge was constructed across the Montague River using piles, large stringers and plank top, and served not only the pedestrian traffic, but also light motor traffic, providing a vital connecting link during the construction of the new Montague bridge. The work of tearing down the bridge will be completed within a few weeks. However, negotiations with the Provincial Government have been entered into with respect to leaving a port at each end to make a small wharf for the fire pump, and in this way to provide easier accessibility to a good water supply on both sides of the bridge, and in that way add considerably to the fire protection which is already of not inconsiderable proportions in the town of Montague.
