The bidding:
East South West North
Pass 1 NT Pass 2 NT

Opening lead—four of hearts.

Barry Crane, West Coast star, was playing in the Mixed Pair event of the San Francisco Regionals last year and held the West hand.

North-South were playing weak one notrump opening bids of the 12 to 14 point variety, a fact which finds some support among tournament players. North, of course, promptly raised to three.

Barry opened a heart and dummy's king held the trick. Declarer could count eight winners. After cashing three rounds of diamonds declarer decided to look for his ninth trick in spades.

He cashed the A-K of spades, hoping the queen would fall, but when the damsel failed to appear

he continued with a spade, East winning with the queen.

Back came the seven of hearts which Crane won with the ace. He could count ten tricks for the declarer—three spades, two hearts, and five diamonds. The defenders at this point had taken only two tricks.

There was no hope of defeating the contract unless three club tricks could be taken immediately.

It was obvious that East had the ace of clubs, because South had already shown up with 12 points in high cards—A-K of spades, queen of hearts (which East would have returned if he had it), and Q-J of diamonds. South could not have the ace of clubs because this card would bring his high card point count to 16—impossible under the weak notrump system.

A club return was clearly indicated. But if Barry had returned the queen of clubs, which seemed like the natural thing to do, South would have made the contract easily by covering with dummy's king. Only two club tricks would be lost, and South would make nine tricks.

To forestall this possibility, Crane returned the two of clubs. Declarer could not be blamed for rushing up with dummy's king. It was difficult for him to assume that the Q-J were being underled. East took the king with the ace to return a club and inflict a one-trick defeat.

Aviation Policy Statement Sought From Federal Gov't

OTTAWA (CP)—The Canadian Aeronautical Institute has asked the government for a "clear statement" of its policy on future research and development and on steps to conserve Canadian scientific and engineering resources.

The institute, which represents 2,300 Canadian aviation scientists, engineers and technicians, has sent a memorandum to Prime Minister Diefenbaker expressing its "serious concern" at implications in the government's Sept. 23 statement on air defence policy.

The government statement said Canadian design, development and production of defence equipment must be closely integrated with United States programs and added:

"The U.S. government recognizes this and they now are prepared to work out production-sharing arrangements with us."

INSTITUTE NOTE

The institute says in its memorandum to the prime minister: "If indeed Canadian future contributions are to be confined to production alone, our present resources of scientific and engineering talent in this most exciting field will be wastefully dispersed to other fields and to other countries."

"Production-sharing" alone is not enough; the creative thinking of which we have shown ourselves capable is the most valuable contribution we have to offer.

"The government should, at an early date, make a clear statement of its policy with regard to future research and development and the steps being taken to conserve our scientific and engineering resources in both men and facilities."

Ex-Nova Scotian Sailor Retires From CNR Service

MONCTON.—A half-century nautical career will end Dec. 31 with the retirement of a Nova Scotian sailor who estimates that in his lifetime he's sailed more than a million miles around the world.

William P. McMullen, Port Hawkesbury native who has been a Moncton resident for the last 10 years retires as marine engineer supervisor for Canadian National Railways in the Maritime Provinces. He came here from Mulgrave, N.S.

He says his plans for the future are indefinite.

"Mrs. McMullen and I may travel some," he mused. "We don't really know yet."

Mr. McMullen played a prominent role in a rapid repair job to the CNR Car ferry Abegweit last weekend. A difficult task, replacing a commutator in an armature—was completed in two days by CNR personnel while the ship was at Borden, P. E. I.

It would have been out of service at least a week had it been drydocked.

Mr. McMullen began his marine engineering career as an apprentice with the Dominion Steel and Coal Company at Sydney in 1910. He served as second engineer on a number of ocean-going tugs, including the Douglas H. Thomas, S.S. Cape Breton, S.S. Lingan and S.S. Hochelaga, prior to joining the Canadian Government Merchant Marine in 1921.
