Notes and Comments.

Bradstreet's report shows that Canada had 869 failures this year against 872 last year.

Superintendent of the Census Porter says that from present indications the returns of the enumerators would show a total population in the United States of 64,500,000, against 59,155,783 in 1880.

The British post office, which in 1840 distributed 76,000,000 letters per annum, now distributes 1,630,000,000, exclusive of postcards, newspapers, etc.

It is estimated at the Treasury Department, Washington, that there has been a decrease of about \$20,000,000 in the public debt of the United States since June.

The census returns from the U. S. cities given below have been announced in a semi-official way thus far: Brooklyn, 939,670; Baltimore, 500,000; Boston, 417,729; Buffalo, 250,000; Cincinnati, 306,000; Chicago, 1,085,000; Cleveland, 248,000; Columbus, 114,000; Detroit, 197,000; Grand Rapids, Mich., 95,000; Indianapolis, 125,000; Louisville, 180,000; Milwaukee, 200,000; Minneapolis, 185,000; New York, 1,627,227; New Orleans, 246,000; Philadelphia, 1,040,450; Pittsburgh, 250,000; St. Louis, 440,000; St. Paul, 138,000; Washington, 230,000.

The shortest strike on record occurred at Acushnet Mill, New Bedford, Mass., on the 2nd inst. A break in the machinery of No. 1 mill caused a suspension of work some time in the forenoon.
