

# WMS is planning memorial book

The beginning of organized missionary work by women of the Presbyterian Church in P.E.I. began in 1825 when the "Princetown Female Society" for the propagation of the gospel and other religious purposes, was formed at Malpeque.

This was the first WMS in Canada. In P. E. I., groups of women continued to organize auxiliaries until in 1886 there were enough members to form the first Presbyterian Women's Foreign Missionary Society.

In 1905 it became the Women's Home and Foreign Missionary Society and finally, in 1915 the present name "The Women's Missionary Society" was adopted.

The Presbyterian meets annually to hear reports and elect officers. Provincial contributions go to the general board of the WMS (Eastern Division) and help support mission work in

many foreign lands, bursaries to student ministers and deaconesses, grants for literature and the education of native women, Girls' Homes and Nursing schools.

A special project of the P. E. I. Presbyterial is the upkeep of Camp Keir at French River which accommodates campers of all ages in the church. The second annual Presbyterian Women's Conference was held in July under the direction of the camp leader, Hugh Lowry of Marshfield.

At the annual meeting in July at New London Mrs. Mildred Gehman, on furlough from India, brought first hand knowledge of missionary works, needs there. Mrs. (Red) Leslie Files was also a guest speaker and told of mission work in the Bill Field. Rev. Claire MacGill, also on furlough from Formosa, spent many years with the people in that beautiful Island and

had with him color slides to illustrate his message.

Presbytery deaconess Mary A. MacKenzie continues to promote interest among WMS, C.G.I.T., Explorer and Young People's Societies. She also conducted teacher training classes and bible vacation schools. Two new auxiliaries have been organized.

Elected to office at the annual meeting were Mrs. Rendle Larier, president; Mrs. Lloyd Wilkie, Mrs. Malcolm MacEachern, Mrs. Wyman Waddell, Mrs. George Dixon, Mrs. Clarence Marchbank and Mrs. Arthur Campbell as vice-presidents; Mrs. A. J. Murchison, recording secretary; Mrs. Stanley Delaney, treasurer.

A project for 1966, which will be completed in the Centennial year 1967, is a memorial book which will include names of men, women and children who have been served and are serving throughout the Eastern Division. Contributions will be used entirely for missionary purposes at the discretion of the board.

Anniversary celebrations in April take the form of a supper party, highlighted by a decorated cake which is cut by the oldest resident, and by the reading



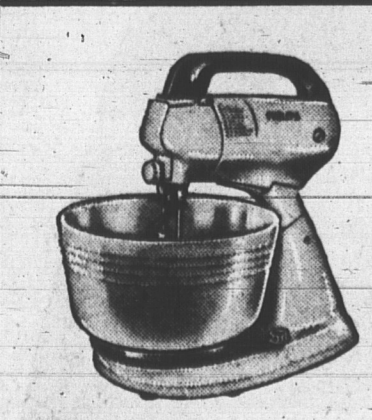
