Strange But True

It is an amazing fact that contagious magic is believed in by civilized and savage peoples alike. Here are a few examples gleaned from all over the globe:

In certain Australian tribes it is a common practice to knock out one or more of a boy's front teeth. Why? Because every male member of the tribe had to submit to this before he could enjoy the rights and privileges of a full-grown man.

In some parts of Europe and especially in Wales, the extracted tooth was placed under the bark of a tree. If the bark grew over the tooth, all was well; but if it were exposed and the ants found it, the natives believed the boy would be the victim of some mouth disease.

The Bostons take great care to conceal their extracted teeth, lest these should fall into the hands of certain mythical persons who would harm the owner of the tooth by working magic on it.
