

Latest About Dreyfus.

LONDON, April 26.—Mr. David Christie Murray publishes the statement that he has learned from trustworthy sources in Paris that the Superior Council of War, including Gen. de Nergrier, Gen. Zirlinden, G. n. Giovanninelli, Gen. Duchesne, and Gen. Jamont, its vice president, none of whom, except, perhaps, Gen. Zirlinden, has heretofore been implicated in the Dreyfus affair, have decided that under no circumstances, whatever, shall Dreyfus be liberated.

He understands from the same sources that negotiations are now proceeding between the intelligence bureau and the judges of the Court of Cassation to secure a revision of the request for revision, and that the judges favoring revision are being urged to fear no intimidation.

"Small Cap." Stories.

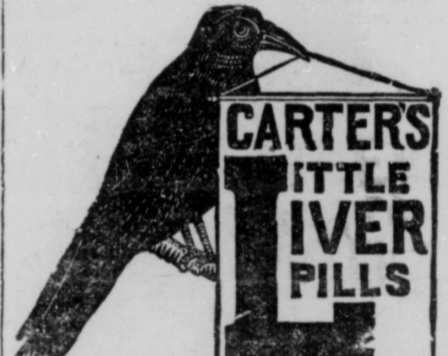
