Sec. 6. Any person buying, selling or exchanging by weights or measures who shall receive a penalty...

Sec. 7. All such platform balances or weighing machines as are used for weighing bulk...

Sec. 8. Any weights, measures, scales, beams, pans, or other articles not stamped or marked as aforesaid notwithstanding that...

Sec. 9. The measure to be used hereafter for the sale, exchange or barter of lime, shall be of a cylindrical form and of capacity to contain...

Sec. 10. No person being in the charge or control of any vessel or wharf or any other place...

Sec. 11. That the Mayor and City Council as soon after the annual election as may be, may appoint a City Marshal...

Sec. 11. All new potatoes, beans, peas, sweet corn, parsnips, carrots, gooseberries, cherries, plums, currants, or other articles...

Sec. 12. All fines and penalties with costs imposed by the several clauses of this Act shall be recoverable before the Mayor or Police Court...

Sec. 13. All fines and penalties recovered under this Act shall be paid before part and parcel of the City funds.

Sec. 14. Nothing in this Act shall prevent the City Council from appointing as the City Assayer of weights and measures, the Assayer of weights and measures of Queen's Quay for the time being.

Law Relating to Stands for Loaded Vehicles. (Assented to Feb. 7, 1856)

Be it enacted by the City Council of the City of Charlotte...

Sec. 1. That the City Council shall appoint suitable places on the squares or such other places within the City as stands for the sale of Charleottian ware...

Sec. 2. The owner, driver or person in charge of any cart, truck, sled, or other vehicle loaded with such articles as aforesaid, standing or being on any of the places so appointed...

Sec. 3. All carts, trucks, sleds, or other vehicles loaded with such articles as aforesaid, arriving at the market square shall be arranged in such order, as the committee appointed to superintend the market may direct...

Sec. 4. No person shall be permitted to erect any stand or to approach to any market-square, so to place any incumbrance thereon, so as to prevent ingress, and egress...

Sec. 5. The beam, scales and weights for sale within the City shall be placed within the enclosure of the market-square for the purpose of weighing meat, butter and such other articles...

Law relating to the City Marshal and his duties and to provide for the regulation and instruction of the City Police. (Assented to Feb. 7, 1856)

Be it enacted by the City Council of the City of Charlotte...

Sec. 1. That the Mayor and City Council as soon after the annual election as may be, may appoint a City Marshal...

Sec. 2. The City Marshal and Police Court shall be sworn to observe and maintain for the service such annual sum or sums as the Mayor and City Council may from time to time determine...

determine in lieu of all fees and they shall receive such compensation in monthly instalments.

CITY MARSHAL. Sec. 3. The City Marshal shall be high Constable within the City and in any City or boundaries that may be hereafter defined in all matters criminal...

Sec. 4. It shall be the duty of the City Marshal to attend the Mayor or presiding Councilor to attend the Mayor or Police Court whenever they shall first and last attend by the command of the Mayor or presiding Councilor...

Sec. 5. The City Marshal shall daily (or often if necessary) report to the Mayor or presiding Councilor, or to the Mayor or Police Court, and shall account brought to his notice, either by the Constables or other persons...

Sec. 6. The City Marshal shall keep a correct record of all the doings of his office, and shall be through every morning of the City Council as often as once in three months and at such other times as they shall require...

POLICE CONSTABLE.

Sec. 7. The City may be divided into districts, the number, extent, and bounds of which shall be determined by the resolution of the City Council...

Sec. 8. Each Constable or as many as may be necessary shall attend the Police Station at eleven o'clock in the morning, and remain on duty till eleven o'clock the following morning during the day wherein they enter on duty at the Mayor's or Police Court...

Sec. 9. All the Constables are to visit their districts previous to their arrival at the Mayor's or Police Court, and to report to him especially all nuisances in yards (particularly where cattle are slaughtered) nuisances and incumbrances in the streets and thoroughfares...

Sec. 10. The Constables are to be sworn to observe and maintain for the service such annual sum or sums as the Mayor and City Council may from time to time determine in lieu of all fees...

Sec. 11. The Constables will hold themselves in readiness to be called upon lawfully called upon either by day or night, for the discharge of their duty...

any shatters from the same on Sunday or after eleven o'clock at night before sunrise on any other day, or who suffer any apprentice, minor, disorderly person or prostitute to frequent the same...

Sec. 10. On Sundays, the district constables, unless called upon by the Mayor, Councilmen or the City Marshal and Constables in their respective districts...

Sec. 11. The Constables will hold themselves in readiness to be called upon lawfully called upon either by day or night, for the discharge of their duty...

Sec. 12. Should any Constable get into difficulty or trouble in the discharge of his duty, after office-hours he is to apply to the Mayor or the Constables for advice and to be guided by his instructions.

Sec. 13. In the event of fire breaking out the Constables shall immediately give the alarm, and see a clock of property to be placed in their best skill and power under the direction of the chief or other engineers...

Sec. 14. Each Constable must have his name and number painted on a tin plate, which plate must be placed on some conspicuous part of the premises...

Sec. 15. The Constables are constantly to wear the dress appointed for them and to carry the same on duty, and at night, and to neglect thereof, the city may sue for the same as the Mayor or presiding Councilor.

Sec. 16. No Constable is permitted to engage in any other business, or to receive any salary by special permission—and when required may attend public meetings, lectures, or exhibitions, provided he shall not obtain of the City Marshal or presiding Councilor or City Clerk...

Law for Establishing a Lock-up House for the City of Charlotte.

(Assented to February 7, 1856)

Whereas much inconvenience is experienced for want of a secure place for the temporary confinement of offenders before trial and conviction...

Be it enacted by the City Council of the City of Charlotte...

Sec. 2. Offenders, arrested on Saturday or on Friday or on the evening previous to either of the said days, may be dealt with in like manner...
