The New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad boasts of having just achieved the latest time ever made on any branch of its consolidated lines. TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

Agitators Released. DUBLIN, June 5. Messrs. Davitt, Healey and Quinn, the Irish agitators, have been released from Kilmainham Jail. The time of their imprisonment should expire in August next.

Exiled Informers. DUBLIN, June 5. The Government has notified James Carey and other informers that they must immediately leave Ireland.

Nihilist Riots. ST. PETERSBURG, June 5. The riots which occurred in this city, during the coronation of the Czar, at Moscow, was instigated by Nihilists.

A Charge Against Parnell. DUBLIN, June 5. Mr. McCoun, M. P. for Wicklow, has withdrawn from supporting Parnell in the House of Commons. He says the object of the party is to lead communistic rebellion.

Summoned to Rome. NEW YORK, June 5. The Archbishops of the United States have been summoned to go immediately to Rome.

Von Moltke Scheming. PARIS, June 5. It is reported here that the object of Count Von Moltke's visit to Italy is to study a scheme for the invasion of Southern France.

Telegraph Notes. It is said that Walton's "Plunger" dropped over \$100,000 at New Market and Epsom.

Lord Dufferin will receive a Marquisate or the Blue Ribbon of the Garter for his services in Egypt.

It is reported that the men-of-war Shannon and Rupert will proceed to China to reinforce the British squadron there.

The race for the Grand Prix de Paris, 100,000 francs, was run on the 2nd, and won by Duc de Castrie's chestnut colt Frontin.

The anniversary of the death of Garibaldi was commemorated on the 3rd throughout Italy. The Syndic of Rome unveiled a bronze bust of Garibaldi in the capitol.

The Herald's London Cable letter says that Lord Arlington and Sir Frederick Johnstone, joint owners of St Blaise, netted £19,000 at the Derby, and the Prince of Wales £5,000. All these gentlemen backed the winner of the Oaks.

The Times' London letter says a question has been placed on the notice papers of the House of Commons to interrogate Mr. Gladstone as to the circumstances of the appointment of the Marquis of Landsowne to the vice-royalty of Canada.

Owing to the fact that a grave imputation has been introduced in the questions put in the House of Commons, on Irish affairs, it is contemplated to call the attention of Mr. Gladstone to the necessity of modifying replies relating to questions.

The Malagassy envoy in London, on the 2nd, stated that they have received no fresh instructions since the attack by the French on the Malagassy territory. They expressed the belief that property belonging to Americans must have suffered during the bombardment of Majunga, as there were two large American houses in the town.

Voltaire says: The French commander in Madagascar has been instructed to withdraw his forces from that country only after Queen Ravalolo has recognized the French protection specified by the treaties of 1840 and 1841. The Admiral will insist on the right of Frenchmen to own land in Madagascar, and will claim an indemnity of 1,500,000 francs for cost of expedition.

In the French Senate on the 2nd, the Minister of Foreign Affairs said all necessary measures would be taken to insure the success of the expedition against Tonquin. By the end of the month, he stated, there would be a small army there capable of coping with the difficulty. The government, he said, must endeavor to smoothe the differences with China. There was no reason to believe that the country would seek a rupture with France, or that she would intervene where she had no rights or interest.

After the fete at Petrofiski Park, Moscow, on the 2nd, the Emperor invited the village elders and marshals of the provincial nobility to a dinner. Addressing the marshals, he said, "I thank you for your fidelity. I am convinced of the cordial feelings of the nobility and hope they will support everything conducive to the benefit of the throne and the fatherland. May God give us a peaceful and quiet life." Five persons were crushed to death in the tremendous crowd that sought admission to Petrofiski Park during the fete.

Prof. Goldwin Smith publishes a powerful article in the June number of the Nineteenth Century, entitled "Why send more Irish to America," recognizing that emigration on a large scale is the true remedy for the Irish distress, but urging that the stream of emigration should be diverted from Canada and the Northern United States where fenianism thrives, he suggests the Southern States as a desirable field. He declares Canada, though the politicians, from fear of the Irish vote, dare not say so, shudders at the thought of receiving a wholesale consignment of Irish terrorists.
