I. O. O. F.—John Richards, Esq., now Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of the Lower Provinces of British North America, arrived here by steamer from Pictou, last evening. He was met on the wharf by a deputation of Oddfellows, and escorted to the "Revere." At half-past seven o'clock, he visited Wilsey Lodge, and expressed himself fully satisfied with the working of the Institution. Immediately after nine o'clock (a special meeting having been convened), he attended a session of St. Lawrence Lodge, and found the working of this Pioneer Lodge of the Order on P. E. Island irreproachable. At ten o'clock a supper was spread at Bro. C. V. McGregor's "Osborne House." It was got up in first class style, and attended by a large number of the brethren. After the feast of good things provided, a few volunteer toasts were proposed and suitably responded to. The company separated, well pleased with the visit of Grand Master Richards. It was the intention of Mr. Richards to have visited Prince Edward Lodge at Summerside on Friday night, he supposing the steamer would return to Charlottetown on Thursday, as previously, but he has been necessitated to forego the pleasure, having occasion to leave for his home in Fredericton, N. B., this morning.

SUPREME COURT.—Beer vs. Creamer: Owing to the Georgetown Court opening on Tuesday, the remainder of this trial has been postponed until the 4th December next.

The prisoners convicted this term were brought up for sentence this forenoon. The Queen vs. John Johnson alias Parsons—Indictment for placing obstructions on the Prince Edward Island Railway. The prisoner was asked what he had to say before sentence was passed. He replied, "Nothing." The Chief Justice then sentenced him to fifteen years in the Dorchester Penitentiary. The Queen vs. George Burnett—Indictment for robbing the mails. Prisoner, when arraigned, pleaded "guilty," and Mr. F. Peters, now on his behalf, produced a memorial, signed by leading men of Hunter River, certifying to the boy's previous good character, and asking for as light a sentence as possible. He also produced a certificate, stating the boy's age to be fifteen. The Court sentenced him to six years in the Penitentiary at Dorchester.

THE Queen on the prosecution of John McKenna vs. William White.—The prisoner having been tried and found guilty of committing "actual bodily harm" upon the person of the prosecutor, was sentenced to two years at Dorchester.

LONDON, July 14.

The Greek Government have offered to send a force of seventeen thousand men to aid England in the campaign against Egypt.

Lord Granville promises that the sovereign rights of the Sultan in Egypt shall not be prejudiced by the intervention of England.

In the massacre in Alexandria two thousand three hundred persons were brutally murdered. Three quarters of the city have been burned.

Sir Garnet Wolesley expects to reach Port Said on Sunday.

It is reported that France and England have arrived at an understanding with reference to Eastern affairs.

The entrance of the Suez Canal is still prohibited.

John Bright has resigned his position in the English Cabinet.
