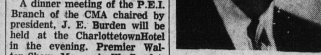


Manufacturers Ass'n Head Planning Ch'town Visit Oct. 4

He said also that although he does not deal in tomatoes his knowledge of tomato production would lead him to think the tomato crop will also be a considerable loss. He said he doubted that even good weather would improve the situation. "I doubt that tomatoes would ever ripen now," he said.

Squash and other vegetables are also doing poorly because of lack of hot weather but a period of good weather now would improve the situation, an agriculture department spokesman said.
