**INCREASED EXPENDITURES.**

The estimates of expenditure by the Dominion Government for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1900, now amount to \$48,933,178—in round numbers \$49,000,000—as against \$41,647,921 for the year 1896-7. This enormously increased expenditure—nearly \$8,000,000—is incurred by the men who made a majority of the farmers and other producers of this country—the men who really pay the “shot”—believe, in 1896, that they would reduce expenditures by \$3,000,000 or \$4,000,000 a year, by the men who denounced the Conservative Government as extravagant and corrupt,—and who thereby obtained thousands upon thousands of votes for the Liberal Party.

But we shall not dwell upon the inconsistency, turpitude and deception made evident in the actual expenditures of the current year and the estimated expenditures for next year. We have to point out, again, that while there are hundreds of thousands of dollars for the ornamentation of Ottawa, to the end that it may be made the Washington of the North, there is not one dollar towards the construction of the Belfast and Murray Harbor Railway and the Hillsborough Bridge! So far the Patriot has been “mum” about this point. We can readily understand that after all the assurances given by its friends, the hurried passage of the Hillsborough Bridge Act by the Provincial Legislature and its dispatch to Ottawa “to be in time,” the leading Liberal organ in this Province is flabbergasted. But our more agile contemporary, The Guardian, comes to time with the following remark:—

“There will be a general feeling of disappointment and regret that there is nothing proposed for the Belfast Railway or the Hillsborough bridge, but, if there is to be an election within the year, we may feel assured that these matters will be provided for in a later supplementary estimate.”

The naïveté of the latter part of this sentence is its greatest beauty. As to the character and motives of the gentlemen in office at Ottawa, no one is better informed than their friend of the Guardian. “If there is to be an election within the year,” the Guardian says, “we may feel assured that these matters will be provided for in a later supplementary estimate.” That is to say, “there is hope yet; there may be an election this year;” “if so a further supplementary estimate will contain an item respecting the construction of the Belfast and Murray Harbor Railway.” We have to doubt about it. If there is to be an election next year, an amount, perhaps a comparatively small amount, just enough to show that the project hasn't been forgotten by the Liberal Leaders, will be voted and will probably be expended in the Belfast district “where it will do most good”—for the Government candidate. The humbug, and dishonesty of the proceeding is evident. But that will not deter “the standard elevators” at Ottawa.

—Rev. Mr. Maxwell, M. P., is reported in Vancouver to be booked for the postmaster-ship of that city. A contemporary remarks that: “It will be a happy spectacle when the Postmaster-General, who in his Opposition days introduced a bill prohibiting the acceptance of office by members of the House, appoints a member to a position in his own department.”

**FROM COW TO CANARY.**

It is seriously reported that a bill now before the London Local Council provides that all owners of canary birds and other feathered pets must secure once every month from the Health Department certificates of the freedom of their birds from tuberculosis. The bill, it is stated, was framed at the urgent instigation of a number of phthisis experts, headed by Dr. A. Tucker Wise. The doctors declare that numerous cases of consumption have been shown to originate from the deadly tuberculosis germs, which breed with startling fecundity in the wing and tail feathers of these supposedly harmless pets. Handbills have already been issued by the Health Department warning the owners of canaries and other songsters against this avian infection. Particular stress is laid on the danger of feeding birds from the mouth and allowing them to place their bills on the lips. Investigation has shown that the mucous membrane in the throat of the canary is more adapted to the rapid growth of phthisis germs than the most carefully prepared cultures. We have not yet heard anything about the application to the canary of the tuberculin test; but it is not improbable that some *seccum* will, ere long propose administering that or something else.

**IN DEFENSE OF OUR POLICE.**

DEAR SIR,—In your Tuesday's daily the City Recorder is reported to have reflected unfavourably on the qualifications of some of our police. Suggestions of this kind often exhibit a retroactive tendency. Who are the faulty policemen, and what their faults? Are they careless or negligent in the service of documents, tardy or helpless in making arrests, disobedient to superiors, addicted to drunkenness, not present on time for duty, or do they sleep while they should be on duty. If so then a disgraceful state of affairs exists and the greater blame lies with a Magistrate who has so far failed in his duty to the public in not once discharging the offenders or at least causing a public investigation of the offence. With all due deference however, to the opinions of the Magistrate I am one of those who believe that we have as good men on our police force as can be found for that purpose in the province. The fault, if any, is with their management. The very nature of their employment brings upon them certain sources of public odium. This should be offset by encouragement and support from law-abiding citizens.
