MRS. MATILDA MACDONALD

The death occurred at Charlottetown on December 15th, 1952 of Mrs. Matilda MacDonald of Peakes Station in her 81st year.

The deceased had been in ailing health for the past three years, but her death came suddenly in the end. During her illness she was frequently visited by her pastor, Rev. J. B. Croken, and in Charlottetown by Rev. Father Bolger, who also was called to her bedside shortly before she passed away.
