Continued from page 1 west and slightly north of Seoul. It is on a peninsula which juts south from North Korea.

Korean sources at Pusan said the raiders killed a Communist brigade commander and 20 other Red officers. They also captured enemy equipment and documents before returning to their ships.

The main weight of a 100,000-man Allied force, aimed at shoving more than 110,000 Chinese and North Koreans out of South Korea, rested on the central front. Tanks and troops of the 7th Division Tuesday crumpled North Korean defenses north of Pangnim and sent the Reds fleeing into the mountains.

It was west of Pangnim that the troops seized eight miles of the vital east-west highway. It winds west for 26 miles from Pangnim to the highway hub of Hoengsong.

Give Details Of Defence Contracts

OTTAWA, Feb. 27. - (CP) - The Government gave its first details today of the big defence projects construction program being launched in Canada, including the building of new and improved barracks blocks at sea, air and army bases.

In a statement by the Government's crown agency - the Defence Construction Limited - contracts of almost \$13,000,000 were announced.

Largest of the contracts - one for \$6,448,000 - went to Bird Construction Ltd., Lethbridge, Alta., for barracks blocks and messes at Camp Shilo, Man., big artillery and paratroop training centre.

The Dartmouth naval base will get new steam generating facilities, a boiler house, tunnels and a new electrical system.

Contracts of more than \$100,000 awarded up to Feb. 1 include: Construction, steam generating plant; Dartmouth, N. S.; Babcock-Wilcox and Goidle-McCullough Ltd., Galt, Ont.; \$279,800.

Construction, boiler house and tunnels, Dartmouth; Acadia Construction Co. Ltd., Bridgewater, N. S.; \$668,000.

Will Address Dairymen Today

Hon. C. C. Baker, Minister of Agriculture and Hon. Eugene Cullen, Minister of Industry and Natural Resources will be guest speakers at the annual meeting of Prince Edward Island Dairymen's Association which will be held in Charlottetown this afternoon and evening.

Mr. Baker will speak to the meeting in the afternoon and Mr. Cullen will address the group tonight. Other highlights of the afternoon meeting will be the president's report by Mr. R. A. Profit and the report of the Dairy Superintendent, Mr. H. J. MacDonald.

The cold storage plant and services that it may provide for the dairy will be discussed at the evening session. The members will also hear a report on the recent meeting of the Dairy Farmers of Canada in Winnipeg from Mr. Profit.

Other activities will include the secretary's report by Mr. Lincoln Dwyer, the presentation of prizes to leading dairies, meeting of accredited delegates, reading of resolutions and a meeting of the Board of Directors.

Outlines Plans For Celebrating Festive Week

Brig. W. W. Reid, guest speaker at the regular monthly meeting last night of the Charlottetown Board of Trade, told the members of the preparations which are now under way for Charlottetown's Festive Week, to be held here July 1 to 7.

A new member of the Board, and chairman of the planning committee for the festivities, Brig. Reid complimented the members on fostering the idea which has met with such wholehearted response from all residents of Charlottetown. Later in the evening it was stated that although the Board did what they could to encourage the idea, it had originally been derived from an address given to the Rotary Club by Brig. Reid, and which a few members of the Board had heard.

It was announced that Col. D. A. MacKinnon had consented to act as assistant chairman of the planning committee, and Brig. Reid continued by outlining the functions of the various sub-committees which had been formed. The tentative program which he outlined for the week met with the enthusiastic approval of all those present.

Messrs. B. Graham Rogers and Gordon Clark, two members of the Board and also convenors of sub-committees for the week, outlined the work done by their committees to date.

Truck Regulations

Discussion was also entered into regarding interprovincial truck trade. It was stated that many trucks bearing loads from this Province were fined in other Provinces and the States for carrying more than maximum loads, and that this was directly due to the system of determining the load in P.E.I. It was stated that the local system is different from that of other Provinces and the States and fines ranging from \$100 up were often paid by truckers. One case was mentioned in which a truck weighing more than 8,000 lbs. was licensed as a 5,500 lb. vehicle, and consequently was often fined in other sections for carrying an excess load.

Mr. A. Walthen Gaudet, Secretary of the Board, stated that the same problem had been taken up with the Government by the Fisheries Federation but nothing had as yet been done.

At the suggestion of Mr. Walter Hyndman, President Frank Storey and Vice-president M. A. Farmer were appointed a committee to look further into the question.

At the opening of the meeting, President Storey spoke of the necessity of an active Board of Trade, and congratulated Walter Hyndman on the excellent address he had made the previous night to the Montague Board who are at present reorganizing.

Defence Projects It was announced by Mr. Storey that a resolution had been passed to the Premier with regard to the obtaining of Defence work for this Province.

Drew Urges Action To Force Controls

OTTAWA, Feb. 27. - (CP) - George Drew, Progressive Conservative leader, tonight urged Canadians to write to their members of Parliament and demand the imposition of controls.

In a speech prepared for delivery on the Nation's Business program over a CBC national network, Mr. Drew said he is convinced emergency controls have become "absolutely necessary" to hold down the cost of living and to combat inflation.

"Inflation is your business and mine," he said. "We have presented every argument we can in the House of Commons, but the Government refuses to act. You still have to win your power to demonstrate that democracy is in fact government of the people by the people themselves."
