

Hockey Deadline Extended To Feb.

MOSCOW (CP)—A Soviet sports committee spokesman said Monday the entry deadline for the world hockey championships in Moscow has been extended from Jan. 1 to Feb. 1. The championships are scheduled for Feb. 24-March 5.

He said applications have been received from five countries, in addition to Russia-Japan, Finland, Poland, Czechoslovakia and West Germany.

Officials of the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association announced last month that Canada would not send a team to the Moscow matches. Russian intervention in the Hungarian revolt was given as the main reason.

Robinson Still Makes News

NEW YORK (AP)—The Jackie Robinson retirement story still is a prime topic of conversation and editorial comment around New York, partly because it has debatable issues and partly because these are the dog days in sports when news is scanty.

The facts are pretty well known by now. The ex-Brooklyn Dodger star two years ago made an agreement with Look to give that magazine an exclusive on the announcement of his retirement for a reported \$50,000 as part of a package deal, and he signed as vice-president of a snack-bar chain about 20 minutes before he was notified he had been traded to New York Giants.

The moot questions are: Should he have given preference to the magazine and ignored the newspaper reporters who had given him such a good press down through the years? Should he have notified the Giants immediately when he decided not to play more baseball instead of leaving them with the impression he would play?

Concerning the first question who can criticize Robinson for making the deal with Look when it meant \$50,000 to him? Newspapers can't pay that kind of money for exclusives and the story wouldn't be worth that much to one of them.

GOOD ARRANGEMENT

Robinson had provided good copy through the years and he was highly publicized in the press because he was good copy. The reporters were paid to write the news and Robinson has been news.

This was a mutually satisfactory arrangement and Robinson had no moral obligation to tell the writers of his plans. He'd have been slightly bawmy to turn down the \$50,000 under the circumstances.

As to the second question though we believe he was wrong. He should have tipped off the Giants that he would not be available instead of giving it that "maybe" and "I don't know" routine and thus leading them and the reporters to believe that the chances were good that he would play.

To us the defect in Robinson's transaction was in keeping his plans from his new employers. We aren't criticizing his taking the \$50,000. If we could get \$50,000 that easy we wouldn't just retire from baseball. We'd retire, period.

Jerry Lynch Is Signed By Reds

CINCINNATI (AP)—The Cincinnati Reds Tuesday signed outfielder Jerry Lynch to a 1957 contract within a few hours after doctors had given him "a clean bill of health" regarding an ailing shoulder.

Lynch and pitcher Russ Meyer were given physical examinations and Redleg General Manager Gabe Paul said both athletes were reported in good shape.

Lynch was drafted from Hollywood of the Pacific Coast League but he was sidelined most of the 1956 season because of what doctors said was plebitis of the shoulder. He appeared in only 19 games with the Pittsburgh Pirates in 1956 before being assigned to Hollywood.

Meyer, acquired from the Chicago Cubs late last season, had been troubled with a pulled muscle in his pitching arm.

FEWER TB PATIENTS

OTTAWA (CP)—Number of patients in tuberculosis sanatoria and hospitals at the end of 1956 showed a decline of 7.1 per cent over the previous year. The bureau of statistics said Monday that the number of patients at the end of last year totalled 14,418, a decrease of 1,102 compared with the corresponding date in 1954.

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
