The Charlottetown Hotel is not planning any public entertainment for New Year's Eve. A number of private parties have been scheduled for the hotel.

After the busy Christmas season there may be some who just want to relax and watch a movie. The Capitol Theatre is prepared for New Year's Eve with a special midnight showing

of Breakfast at Tiffany's, starring Audrey Hepburn.

The Charlottetown Forum will be closed on the night of the 31st but on the 30th will hold a Band Skate from 8:30-10:30 p.m. with the P.E.I. Regiment Band in attendance.

## City Police Probe Crash

City Police are carrying out further investigations on an incident on Thursday night when an unknown car and its occupants drove through the First Baptist Church steel railing, strewn about 25 feet over the church lawn early Friday morning.

Police who investigated the incident about 12:30 a.m. Friday morning said they arrived to find a steel fence partly smashed with wheel marks on the church lawn and foot tracks around the spot where the car had stopped.

Sgt. Keith Wakelin said a number of broken automobile parts were found on the scene and it is thought the car may be an old English make heavily laden with body fill. Paint examined at the scene indicated a dark blue model.

Investigations indicate the automobile involved was proceeding west on Fitzroy Street when it drove up over the sidewalk, smashed through the railing and was pushed back onto the street where it was remobilized.

The co-operation of the public who may have witnessed this accident would be appreciated by police in their attempt to discover the automobile's driver.

HALIFAX (CP) — The weather office says strong northerly winds in the wake of an intense storm, now centered 150 miles northeast of Sydney, were bringing extremely cold air to the Maritimes late Sunday.

Temperatures were already in the low teens over much of New Brunswick at 10 p.m. AST. The snow had tapered off to snowflurries over all except the more eastern regions.

It is expected to be extremely cold today in all three provinces. New Brunswick will be mostly sunny; however, over the other two provinces skies will be generally cloudy and scattered snowflurries will persist, especially in localities where the wind blows off open water.

The northerly winds will "finish only slowly today.

Regional forecasts:

Eastern Shore, Cape Breton, Prince Edward Island: Mostly cloudy today with snow changing to snowflurries early in the morning; extremely cold. Winds northerly 25 with gusts to 30 diminishing this evening to northwesterly 20. Low-high at Goose Bay, Sydney and Charlottetown 16 and 20.

High tide today at Charlottetown 12:41 a.m. and 2:34 p.m. At Rustico at 8:16 p.m. Summerside tide eighteen minutes later than Charlottetown. Sun rises today at 7:34 a.m. and sets at 4:34 p.m.
