A GOOD SPECULATION.—The Picot Standard reports—

"The brig, Maggie, of Charlottetown, arrived here on Tuesday last. This vessel, laden with oats, on her first voyage, ran ashore at Soubis, P. E. I., last fall, and being condemned, was sold for the benefit of the underwriters. She was bought by Mr. Gillan for about \$3,000, and will return that gentleman something handsome, as she is in perfect order, with new and good rigging and sails. She will go on the ship as soon as possible for repairs."

MAN DROWNED.—The body of a man was found floating in the harbor on Sunday morning. It proved to be that of John Hanford, an Englishman about forty years of age—known in this city as "John Robinson." He had, during the winter, been in the employ of Mr. Herbert Beer. He has, we understand, a wife and children in the mother country. His coat was found on the railway breakwork. It is supposed that his death was not accidental, nor was he under the influence of liquor. On Saturday he complained that he was unwell.

DEATH OF A WAIF.—The infant abandoned two and a half years ago in the garden of a citizen, and rescued from the jaws of death by the kind wife of Richard Weeks, Esq., recently fell a victim to scarlet fever. This circumstance again raises the question whether or not the community at large should make some provision for foundlings. Is it right to test the charity of individuals as that of Mr. Weeks and his wife has been tested? Decidedly not. Some fund should be raised—some provision made—to meet such cases.

Mrs. MELANCOLY.—Seventy-two persons went down in the ill-fated schooner Katie. They were chiefly Highlanders and French men from Harbor Bouche, Tracadie, Cape Jack, Cape Breton, Steep Creek, Port Hood, Port Mulgrave and Antigonish. As the Katie sailed for Boston from Port Mulgrave on the 23d of April, and has not since been heard of, it is extremely improbable that any account of her will ever be received. The Katie was commanded, and we think owned, by Capt. James Forrestall, of Auld's Cove. He was, no doubt, known to many on the Island.—Pat.

PROFESSOR COLLIER performs in Market Hall this evening. The Halifax Herald gives the following notice of one of his entertainments—

"The opening night of the Professor at Temperance Hall was a great success. The hall was crammed, and some hundreds of persons were unable to obtain admittance. On the 26th ult., after an illness of five months, Josephine Caroline, the beloved wife of Mr. John LeLachour, of this city, aged 47 years, leaving a disconsolate husband and four children, to mourn their loss.

A man in Massachusetts married his step-daughter and as this was illegal, the Legislature passed a bill to legalize the marriage, but the Governor has vetoed the bill, and unfortunately a man whose name is Patron, is in a bad plight. He will have to go elsewhere to get married or take some other girl to wife, or remain single.

THE SEN OF THE PRINCE'S ISLANDS.—Dr. Russell writes the Times—Without much compliment to the British, it may be said that they are in advance of the Neapolese population. What we saw of Nepal was the smallest possible glimpse of it—a bit of territory which was given by Lord Caning to the Government of Katanadoo as reward for services in 1858. One must not judge of a house from a brick. It is fair to suppose that it is the worst part of the state, because there is more game in it, for Sir John Balaudor, whose sole object was to give the Prince's sport, would not have asked him to any but the best game district. That he succeeded in that object is unquestionable, for the Prince got 15 tigers to his own gun. One of these would soon have been shot by the Prince, and very unusual number. The tiger shot by the Prince at Jeypore—his first in India—was also about to increase the species, and several young ones have been killed or taken, so that something has been done in the way of lessening the number of those ferocious and destructive beasts. By-the-way, it is well to observe here that the small house which was mentioned in the telegram as the place whence the Prince took his first shot at 20 tigers, was one of the regular tiger "boxes" used by the Maharajah for the purpose of shooting, which may be observed in the valleys around the capital. Without scoring the cubs, born and unborn, the royal party killed in Kutanadoo 15 tigers, of which the Prince shot 15. The rest were killed by Lord A. Paget 1, Lord Sheffield 2, Lord Carington 2, Prince Louis of Battenberg 1, Lord C. Beresford 1, Colonel Ellis 2, Mr. Ross 1, leaving four to be assigned to the remainder of the sportsmen, as General Probyn who only fired on one occasion, would not claim a tiger generally assigned to him. Besides tigers there were wild boars, bears, leopards, and hundreds of deer of several kinds, and hundreds of partridges and of different sort of birds killed in the general shooting. The flesh of the estate animals and birds was very welcome to the camp followers.
